HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Society Receives National Honors

The American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) has selected Canterbury's One-Room Schoolhouse program to be the recipient of its 2012 Award of Merit by their Leadership in History Awards Committee. The AASLH Leadership in History Awards is the nation's most prestigious competition for recognition of achievement in state and local history. The program is really a community effort involving the staff at the elementary school, a host of community volunteers, docent teachers and the historical society. This is the second award the program has received this year. Joan Leggett nominated to receive the Country School Association of America's National Service Award in April for her outstanding work in developing the Schoolhouse Program. Hurray!!!...and congratulations to all involved.

Society to Publish "Churches of Canterbury" Book

The Society is moving ahead to publish a book which documents the "Churches of Canterbury" show mounted last year in the Elkins Memorial Building. Many hours have been devoted to its publication and we expect to have it available for sale at the Canterbury Fair.

Exhibition to Open Fair Day

Work is progressing on the Historical Society's exhibit to be unveiled on Fair Day. Its subject is "Canterbury's Founding Fathers" and will be in the Elkins Memorial Building.

Lyford's Canterbury History Celebrates 100th Anniversary

This summer Canterbury will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the first printing of James Otis Lyford's History of Canterbury, 1727-1912.

This monumental work preserves our town's long history from the charter of 1727, through the Indian Raids, the wars in which we fought, the prosperous times and our achievements. It speaks of our town's religions, societies, schools, and taverns. It includes maps with detailed descriptions of each house and its owners. The whole second volume is dedicated to the genealogies of our local families.

These two volumes are the long work of a committee of twelve dedicated townspeople, aptly called the Canterbury History Committee, that served under Mr. Lyford collecting all the necessary information. The work was "officially" started in 1909, and was completed under Mr. Lyford's guidance in 1912. There were over 500 sets printed, for \$5 a set, and sent around the globe, to private homes, historical societies, and libraries alike. They were very well received in town.

By 1970, when the Canterbury Historical Society was founded, all the sets had been sold and it was the first initiative of the Society to reprint the book for the Bicentennial. The second printing was finished in 1973, under the leadership of the late Mrs. Catherine Dickson, and was again a great success with the townspeople of Canterbury.

Copies can be viewed at the Elkins Public Library, as well as online at Archive.org.


