

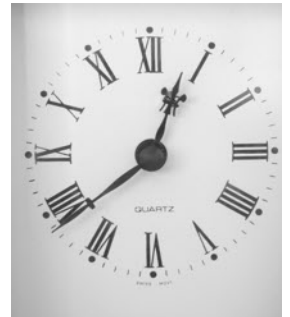
FOR EVERYTHING THERE IS A SEASON

CHURCH NEWS

Pastoral Transition Update Number 2

As the Canterbury United Community Church (CUCC) moves through this period of transition to a new settled pastor, the Church Council will be communicating information regarding the pastoral transition through the Newsletter, as well as other means. I have written this second update to provide information regarding where we are in the process. It has been about two months now since Mel's retirement, and in that time the Church Council prepared a document summarizing information regarding the CUCC to be used by the United Church of Christ (UCC) in selecting potential candidates for the position of transitional interim pastor. The interim pastor will perform the functions of a pastor and help guide the CUCC in our search for a settled pastor.

The summary document, or profile, was provided to the UCC in early July, and by early August the UCC provided the Church Council with information summarizing three candidates for interim pastor. The Church Council reviewed the candidate profiles, and is in the process of interviewing one or more of the candidates. We hope that we will complete the interview and negotiation process within the next few weeks.

The process of selecting the interim pastor is led by the Church Council and typically does not include opportunities to have the candidates preach to the Congregation. The Church Council will make its decision based on the information provided by the UCC and interviews with any candidates called by the Church Council. The Church Council is comprised of the officers of the CUCC and representatives of the various committees established in the CUCC bylaws.

Under the interim pastor a search committee will be established to find a settled pastor, and there will be many opportunities for reflection by, and input from, the Congregation.

During the next few weeks we will continue to have supply pastors fill the pulpit. We have been fortunate to have some inspiring leadership over the summer including from within our own congregation. The recent and upcoming supply pastors provide examples of various approaches to Worship leadership, and will have been a useful experience as we get to work selecting a settled pastor.

Lastly, in this period of transition the Church Council prepared the adjacent contact list; if you have a need, comment, or question, please use the list.

Monarch Butterfly Watch

Early September is peak migration time for Monarchs when they fly from our region to Mexico to their overwintering site. For the past several years I've been tagging Monarch butterflies as a citizen scientist for Monarch Watch at KSU. The monarch population has decreased over the last several years and much research is being done on this butterfly. Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed as their sole source of food. If you have milkweed growing in your yard and notice any caterpillars living on them I would be happy to raise them to the butterfly stage so they can be tagged for their trip south. Monarch caterpillars are yellow, black and white and are not fuzzy. (There is another milkweed caterpillar with the same colors that is very fuzzy and it's the Tussock Moth.) If you have any monarch caterpillars you can either drop them off in a container with air holes and some milkweed leaves at Petals in the Pines, 126 Baptist Rd., or I will come get them. Post Office News

The Canterbury Post Office will be closed on Monday, Sept. 3, Labor Day. Other than that, we will be open our regularly scheduled hours.



There are a number of new stamp issues that have been released this summer. There is an issue commemorating Bicycling; it shows four different aspects of bicycling. There is a sheet of stamps that honor Great Film Directors – John Ford, Frank Capra, Billy Wilder, and John Huston. Another sheet shows Innovative Choreographers – Isadora Duncan, Jose Limon, Katherine Dunham, and Bob Fosse. A third sheet has Major League Baseball All-Stars. It has Willie Stargell, Ted Williams, Larry Doby, and Joe DiMaggio. There is also a very artistic looking sheet of stamps commemorating musicians Miles Davis and Edith Piaf. A very recent arrival is a Sheet of stamps in memory of the War of 1812. The sheet has a painting of the USS Constitution. All of these are Forever stamps. Since the price is no longer written on these stamps, I should remind you that the current cost of mail a first class letter is 45 cents. In addition to these postage stamps, we now have the 2012/2013 Migratory Bird stamp. These still cost \$15.

There has been very little new information about the proposed cutting of hours for the smaller Post Offices. We are still on the list to have our hours cut by 2 hours each weekday. There are no details about how this would be accomplished. It appears that office the size of Canterbury would still have their own postmasters but there is very little information about that also. Implementation is still scheduled for some time in the middle of 2014. When I get anything more definite, I will pass it along.

Clerk's Office News

I hope everyone had a good summer. I wanted to bring everyone up to speed on some changes that have come along especially for voting. NH enacted a Voter ID law this year which will be in effect for the September 11 State Primary and November 6 Federal Election. You can find details of this new law at sos.nh.gov (the Secretary of States website) and I have posted an explanation at the Canterbury Country Store, the Library and the Sam Lake House. There are many forms of ID that will be accepted. If you have any questions please give us a call; this is new for all of us and we want to make it as painless as possible.

On another note: as of September 1st we will be enforcing, RSA 261:148 p4, which requires that you bring in your renewal notice or an old registration for all vehicles you are renewing. If you have extenuating circumstances please let us know and we will find a way to accommodate you.

DA DUMP NEWS

Clean out those closets and support recycling at Canterbury Elementary!

Through a partnership with EcoSmith recyclers in Bedford, NH, we earn money for every pound of clean bagged clothing delivered to the receptacles at the transfer station and elementary school. When you clean out old clothing and shoes please use these receptacles to support local recycling!

The Transfer Station and our PAYT system...

only remains fair and equitable if everyone who uses the facility uses the standard PAYT bags for ALL their trash and pays for bulky additional items per the published schedule. If you come with additional items or big black bags be prepared to pay a premium for them because they are generally made of heavier weight plastic and hold more volume and weight of trash. Plastic, aluminum, paper, steel & glass recycling are still FREE to recycle, with additional items of plastic (#2,4,6 buckets, bins & toys) as well as screw-top lids being added to our list of recyclable items recently. Maximize your savings by keeping all of these materials out of your trash and recycling them instead.

Due to a lack of exporting, paper recycling revenue is the lowest it has been in almost a decade, so it's very important to fill our container to maximum capacity to minimize transportation costs. According to national estimates, paper comprises 70% of an average bag of trash so put anything that rips in the recycling bin instead. You can also save yourself some money by donating all computers and computer components to your local Goodwill store. They have an ongoing partnership with Dell to recycle old computers and parts that is FREE to consumers.

Construction/Demolition debris is priced at \$50 per cubic yard, and shingles at \$75 per cubic yard. Small amounts are roughly twice as much as trash disposal; please plan to pay accordingly when factoring disposal costs from home & building renovations. Clean wood (not painted, stained, pressure-treated or plywood) <6" in diameter can go into the brush pile after it is inspected by staff and is FREE, so to save \$\$ keep clean untreated material separate from demolition debris.

Thank you for keeping our recycling program strong and the PAYT system fair and equitable by abiding by the policies of our facility!
