Pastoral Perspective

2011 was certainly a year of challenges for many folks in Canterbury. Weather events, life threatening illnesses, the deaths of friends and townspeople, the sluggish economy and the saga of the failed parsonage well left me feeling a sense of somber relief that the year was over. Now I begin to look at 2012 and I want to approach it with a different four-letter word than some I used over events of the year past. The word is HOPE.


Hope is trusting in a good future or outcome when there is no clear view or all the signs point to the opposite result. Hope is the human quality that kept great reformers focused; enabled POWs to come through their ordeals; given terminally ill individuals the power to bear treatments and set-backs; turned a person in despair back to the value of his/her life.

I want to encourage you to ground yourself in HOPE for this new year. Unitarian minister, Forrest Church, faced with cancer, wrote a very meaningful book, Love and Death. The title may disturb you, but the pages are filled with hopeful ideas. One insight is a mantra he developed for his living through his illness: "Want what you have; do what you can; be who you are." My experience is that living each of these practices has necessitated my seeking God's guidance, power and love. Perhaps that's part of the mystery of hardship and suffering: that it forces us to look beyond our narrow view and see the bigger picture of life's blessings and possibilities.

In 2012 I hope the various elections at all levels will bring forth statespeople who will build on common ground and accept the good ideas of contrary approaches. I hope new medicines will help lots of people, but also that mutual love and encouragement will make sick people and their loved ones find goodness and blessing in daily living. I hope that many folks in desperate financial situations will be led to relief and meaningful labor. I hope people will become more open to change. I hope people will give up fear and look to others as kin. I hope that labors of love will overshadow our society's obsession with all matters of sexuality. I hope fabrics of love will be woven around individuals in grief over love lost. I hope I will grow in patience, appreciation, and wonder.

You know what? Many of these hopes may not be fulfilled. But some will. And I believe 2012 will be a good year. That is my fervent prayer for everyone in Canterbury.

AROUND TOWN

Planning Board to Hold Three Public Meetings on January 24th

The Canterbury Planning Board will hold three Public Meetings on Tuesday, January 24, 2012, at the Meeting House (next to the new Elkins Library in Canterbury Center). The first meeting will start at 7:00 pm. The second and third meetings will start as soon as the previous meeting is done. Canterbury residents are encouraged to attend, ask questions, and make suggestions. Full copies of the documents containing the proposed changes to our Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations will be posted by January 13th at the Sam Lake house, the Canterbury Country Store, and on-line at www.canterbury-nh.org. Short summaries of these documents are also provided below.

Public Meeting #1: Amendment to Article 2.6 (Signs) of the Town of Canterbury Zoning Ordinance. This section defines requirements on commercial (business) advertising signs. The key purpose of the proposed amendment is to prohibit animated message center signs and internally lighted signs.

Public Meeting #2: New Section IX C (Highway Protection and Control Regulations Delegation of Authority, Driveways and Other Accesses to the Public Way) to the Town of Canterbury Subdivision Regulations. Pursuant to the authority vested in the Canterbury Planning Board by the voters of the Town of Canterbury in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 674:35, the Canterbury Planning Board hereby adopts the following regulations ... The Planning Board shall delegate to the Highway Agent, through the Board of Selectmen and in accordance with RSAs 236:13 V and VI the authority to issue and enforce driveway permits.

Public Meeting #3: New Article 17 (Groundwater Protection) to the Town of Canterbury Zoning Ordinance. The purpose of this ordinance is, in the interest of public health, safety, and general welfare, to preserve, maintain, and protect from contamination existing and potential groundwater supply areas and to protect surface waters that are fed by groundwater. The purpose is to be accomplished by regulating non-residential land uses and home occupations not exempt from this ordinance, which could contribute pollutants to wells or aquifers needed for present or future public and private water supply.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

BOSTON POST CANE TO BE PRESENTED TO MARGE BRUNER. The Historical Society cordially invites you to attend the celebration of the unveiling of the "Boston Post Cane" at the Elkins Library on Sunday, January 29th at noon. Not only will it be unveiled. but also be presented at that time to the oldest resident of Canterbury, Marge Bruner. The Cane has not been given to a Canterbury resident for many years, having been missing and only recently "re-discovered". It has been stored in the Society's Archives since. In the Spring, the Society determined to reestablish the tradition which came with its being awarded to the Town Selectmen in 1909, by the Boston Post newspaper. **I** Board member Brian Titilah led the research on how other New $^{!}$ England towns currently handle the Cane's presentation and made recommendations to the Selectmen and the Board. Upon their acceptance, Brian Braskie, noted N. H. Furniture Master and member of our Board, volunteered to create a display case to hold the century-old treasure. It will be on permanent display in the library for all to see and containsbrass nameplates for all future recipients.

Please join us on the 29th to witness the unveiling and to experience the joy of having it presented to Marge Bruner, Canterbury's oldest resident. Refreshments will be served.

Fire Department News

Thank you all for your contributions to our mezzanine fund raising drive. We are about 1/3 of the way to being able to start work. If you didn't win the firewood raffle this time, we have cut another cord and will be holding a raffle in January. Just in time for the really cold weather. Tickets will be available from any firefighter or at the station during the weekdays.

Do you know the number one cause of home fires? Cooking. Most start on the top of the stove. So when you use the stove, here are a couple of rules to follow. First, never leave the room when the stove is on. We also recommend that you not heat an empty pan on high. If you have a fire that spreads beyond the pan, leave the room, close the door, dial 911, and get everyone out of the house. Also, never disable the smoke detector near the kitchen. If it goes off all the time, move it but don't disable it. It can be replaced with a "Heat Rise" detector that senses the ceiling temperature.

Number two on the list of causes of home fires is heating. Fireplaces and wood stoves are major causes of fires. Usually, the flues are dirty with creosote but if items are placed too close to the heater, they can catch fire also. Use a 3-foot rule to keep things away from the heat source.

Carbon monoxide detectors have about a 5-year lifetime and should be replaced. Because carbon monoxide is slightly lighter than air, detectors should be placed on the wall and about 5 foot high. There should be one on every floor. If you can only buy one, put it near the sleeping area of the house. Test the alarm and change the batteries at least once a year.

Smoke detectors have about a 10-year lifetime and also need to be tested and replaced when necessary. If you need new smoke or carbon monoxide detectors, we have a supply at the fire station at a very low cost.

You may have seen a lot of fire engines on Hackleboro Road this October. No, I didn't have a fire at my house. We were doing a training exercise and had fire departments from neighboring towns help us provide enough water to put out a pretend fire. It went very well and we learned a lot. We were able to provide over 350 gallons of water per minute for about two hours.

POST OFFICE

There are two Federal holidays in January. The Canterbury Post Office will be closed on Monday, January 2. It will also be closed on Monday, January 16, Martin Luther King Day. We will keep our normal hours for the rest of the month.

On Sunday, January 22, postal rates will change. The price of a single first class stamp will go up one cent, so it will cost 45 cents to mail a normal letter. A larger envelope will cost 90 cents for the first ounce. The price for the extra ounces for both letters and large envelopes stayed at 20 cents. As usual some of the other prices and fees will be affected by these changes but I have not been given a price list for these items.

There will also be rate increases for Priority and Express mail starting on January 22. These prices haven't been finalized as I write so they may not be exact. For Priority Flat Rate items the Flat Rate envelope will be \$5.15. The small Flat Rate box will be \$5.35. The medium Flat Rate boxes will be \$11.35. The large Flat Rate box will be \$15.45. For Express Mail the Flat Rate envelope will be \$18.95. The price of an international letter will be \$1.05. Almost all of the stamps that we have sold this last year were Forever stamps, so they will still be good after the rate change.

January is the month when I usually remind customers who get mail delivered to their houses to keep their mail boxes cleared of snow. It seems unnecessary on a day when the temperatures are in the 50's but I'm sure this won't last. I did want to point out that customers who get their mail



delivered to a PO box don't have to worry about this.

In closing I did want to thank everybody who used the Canterbury Post Office during the holiday season. I have heard nothing about any changes that would affect this office, which I assume is good news. Anyway, I hope you have a happy and healthy new year.


