Dear Friends.

If you are familiar with Garrison Keillor's Prairie Home Companion radio show on Saturday evenings, then perhaps you know of his Lake Wobegon monologue about the July 4 Parade. It seems that every year the citizens of this little town, a town that time forgot and the decades cannot improve, make a living American flag on Main St. during the Fourth of July Parade. If I recall, the problem with the flag is that, since everyone is in it, no one can see it. So, the solution was to have each person take a turn climbing up to a nearby rooftop, so she or he could look down on the beauty of the living flag.

Small towns with vibrant community life have that nice problem, don't they? We see each other in numerous places over the course of any week. When we need to visit the Post Office, the Country Store, the Library, or the Town Offices we inevitably meet others. Some we know and others we meet for the first time, but the expectation is, unless we bury our chins on our chests and stare at the floor, that we will at least acknowledge our neighbor. "How are things with you?" Everyone participates somehow to make up the fabric of our town in countless ways throughout the year.

Encounter and loving acceptance is the advice given throughout the Bible, from a wandering Aramean named Abraham in the Hebrew Scriptures to Jesus in the Gospels. In what seems like a perfect inversion of today's popular wisdom, the pursuit of self-interest alone, a small town like Canterbury practices the ancient art of loving kindness (hesed in Hebrew, metta in Sanscrit, it's universal), knowing deep down that considering the interest of our neighbor benefits us as well.

And without a large building on Main Street to climb for a view, all we can do is keep making the flag, in its various shapes and colors, over and over again, and know in our hearts that we are part of it.



This letter is in no way meant to scare you but to inform you of the facts that have come to light in recent storms that have hit the area. Please keep safe and have a nice summer.



Canterbury Agriculture Commission

wants you to know about...

SPI-Soil Potential Index, used by assessing officials to determine where within the Farmland assessment range the property should be assessed.

Farmland is any tract or tracts of undeveloped land, devoted to, or capable of the production of agricultural or horticultural crops; and land containing roads constructed for the purpose of harvesting agricultural or horticultural crops shall be assessed as farmland, as determined and classified by criteria developed by the commissioner of agriculture, markets, and food and adopted by the Current Use board. (RSA 79-A:2 VI).

A Soil Potential Index (SPI) is a number which indicates the production capability of farmland as determined by the United States Soil Conservation Service. The SPI is available from County Conservation District offices for a minimal fee and your local district office can be found here.

(www.nh.nrcs.usda.gov).

If the landowner does not provide the SPI to town assessing officials, they may use their own discretion assigning a valuation within the assessment range. However, if the landowner does provide the town with a SPI, the town is required to use it.

Cub 304.02(e) provides the formula for assessing farmland. Assuming an SPI of .60, the formula would calculate as follows:

High end of farm land range \$425

Low end of farm land range <u>-25</u>

Difference 400

Sample SPI of .60 x.60

Subtotal 240

Low end of range added back +25

Per acre assessed value \$265

Note: Many towns assess farmland at a rate within this range, but by not having an SPI, you are assessed at the range they determine, which may not always reflect your particular soil's ability to produce crops. We have seen SPI ranges as low as 6%. Here is a sample of the different per acre assessed value.

High end of farm land range \$425

Low end of farm land range <u>-25</u>

Difference 400 x.06

Sample SPI of .06

Subtotal \$24.00

Low end of range added back +25

Per acre assessed value \$49.00

The SPI, which is a science-based number that reflects your farmland soil's relative ability to produce agricultural crops, could possibly lower your farmland's assessment rate as evidenced above.

More details on farmland assessment may be found in the Current Use Handbook Section 304.02.

Transfer Station and Recycling Center Updates:

New Sign:

You may have noticed that the transfer station has a new sign at the entrance! We received this sign through the NH The Beautiful grant program and our highway crew put it up for us. It reads *Canterbury Recycling Center* instead of *Transfer Station* now, which is fitting since residents using the facility have been recycling at greater than 50% for some years now, and it places the emphasis on the great work recycling that you all do so well. The official name will remain the same for permitting reasons. We are interested in adding a small raised bed around the base of the sign with some low-maintenance shade-loving perennials: if you have some that may need to be divided please email Adrienne at CanterburyTransferandRecycling@gmail.com or call 783 9980. I will gladly dig them and make tidy the place they used to inhabit.

Mercury Products:

Just a reminder that <u>only intact mercury thermostats</u> can be accepted for recycling! Mercury thermometers and elemental mercury in other containers is <u>absolutely NOT accepted</u>.

Only certified hazardous-waste handlers can take these mercury-containing items. Mercury-containing compact fluorescent bulbs are accepted, but cost 50¢ each, and 25¢/ft for tubes, although Lowes and Home Depot will take the CFL's for <u>free.</u> Please call your local store for details.

If you break a mercury lightbulb DO NOT vacuum it up, sweep it into a plastic bag using stiff cardboard or paperboard and seal it, open external windows and wash the area and your hands thoroughly with soap and water.

Stay calm, there is a maximum of about 1/500th the mercury in an old mercury thermometer present in a CFL, and about 60% is released when it breaks and 40% remains in the broken pieces. Pregnant women and young children should steer clear of the clean-up process.



What is the Canterbury Fund?

The Canterbury Fund is a charitable trust established by Alexander Standish of Canterbury on June 10, 1966. The purpose of the Fund is to aid, financially, those Canterbury, NH residents who are in need of financial assistance due to the destruction of their homes or other hardships resulting from accident, or who have endured poor health of any member of the immediate family, or who need special education or treatment as a result of physical or mental handicaps of any member of the immediate family, or who are worthy students needing assistance for higher education. This aid is to be provided in the form of non-interest bearing cash loans without specific maturity. These loans to individuals are kept confidential.

In addition, the Fund may make grants to organizations in Canterbury to assist in the funding of community projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, are in the best interest of all Canterbury residents. As stipulated by Mr. Standish, the trustees of the fund are the trustees of the Canterbury United Community Church.

The trust also established a Canterbury Fund Loan and Grant Committee. This committee receives all requests to the fund for loans or grants. The committee makes recommendations to the trustees, who may approve or disapprove the recommendation of the committee. The Loan and Grant Committee is made up of the following organizations: the PTO, the Volunteer Fire Dept., the Ladies Benevolent Society, and the Trustees of the Elkins Fund.

Over the last 46 years since the fund was established, the fund has grown both through interest on the principal and proceeds from the Town Fair. The Fair was started by the CUCC, and is now a town-wide endeavor presently chaired by Lisa Carlson. Her phone # is 783-0335 and she always has great volunteer opportunities for those who want to help.

Canterbury has seen many changes since 1996. The Trust document allows the trustees of the fund some latitude in updating procedures. The trustees are always interested in your thoughts.
