FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends.

I'm writing this from a small room on the edge of Lake Winnipesaukee, at dawn on a Sunday morning in mid-August. The sunrise is brilliant. For the last forty-eight hours I have visited with my sisters, and a brother. This annual gathering is always a time for telling stories of a past we share since birth, woven with the stories of who we are now. The conversations usually take a familiar form. "How are you?" "How's it going?" "How are the kids?" (kids being adults in their own right with their own children at this point). "Remember the time...?" Laughter and tears, tension and intimacy, ebb and flow, as we check in with each other. We are shaped by a common past, and by a current life that stretches our bonds as we make decisions about what might happen next to us. We're old enough to know that one never knows how things will turn out. The love, however, fragile and resilient at the same time, seems to call us back to each other.

There are Sabbath times of renewal for us all, every day, aren't there? When I begin the short journey to Canterbury on a Monday morning I'm apt to get coffee at a convenience store just before launching onto I-93. Jay, the proprietor, is Lebanese. We know each other only by first names, but I suspect Jay has seen much in his life because of the way he always says, "It's a good day, Bill, I'm living the life..", then he blesses me with words hoping the same sort of day for me. As I pick up the church mail at the Post Office, our postmaster, Ted, and I will comment on how incredibly fitting this exact day is, just right for the season in which it finds itself to be. Unsaid, I suspect, is the blessing of gratitude for the gift of being able to live in it.

During the course of the day there are untold greetings as we encounter each other. Sometime close up enough for talking, sometimes at a distance for a quiet shout and a wave, the unspoken message is always, "There you are. I see you, and I'm glad for that; I wish you well." This week we'll bid safe journey to some in our town who will travel to distant places for the first time, starting college. We'll hold them and their families in our thoughts and prayers.

This morning in Canterbury we will baptize a baby boy named Jack Mitchell. The ancient words and ritual might seem distant from what I've been pondering this morning so far, but they aren't. I don't think they are. We'll sprinkle water on his forehead, invoke God's blessing as we say his name, reminding ourselves that we are all blessed in this way. We'll promise to help him grow and thrive, as much as we are able, and it occurs to me that we do that sort of thing for ourselves every day, in ways large and small.

Right now, the sun is brilliant as it rises over the trees, and shimmers on the lake's surface. The air is quiet and still. Within the hour I'll head south on the highway to make my way to Canterbury. It's a good day. I see you. I'm so glad to be in it with you. Blessings, dear friends.

PURPLE CAPS FOR BABIES!

All babies go through a normal period of increased crying in the first few months of life. This increased crying typically begins at about two weeks of age, peaks in the second month of life, and becomes less in the third or fourth month. Some infants cry more than others, and in some infants you may not even notice the increased amount of crying, but ALL infants do cry more during this period.

The Period of PURPLE Crying is an evidence-based program to help parents and caregivers understand this normal increased crying in healthy infants and prevent abuse; namely, shaken baby syndrome. The word "PURPLE" is an acronym to help parents and caregivers recognize and remember the characteristics of normal infant crying.

For information about the Click for Babies campaign, including patterns for purple caps (being given to NH hospitals for babies born in November and December) visit <u>clickforbabies.org</u>. There is also information at <u>nhchildrenstrust.org</u>.

Post OfficeNews

There is one Federal holiday in September. The Canterbury Post Office will be closed on Monday, September 2, to celebrate Labor Day. We will maintain our normal schedule for the rest of the month.

The US Postal Service made some changes this summer. Our premium service, which used to be called Express Mail, is now called Priority Mail Express. This service is the same; guaranteed delivery time, tracking, \$100 insurance, postage refunded for USPS failures.

The regular Priority Mail has undergone some changes. Earlier this year, tracking numbers were added to all Priority Mail. Recently, the Postal Service added \$50 of insurance coverage for all Priority Mail items. Your receipt will give you a scheduled delivery date. Unlike Priority Mail Express, this is not a guaranteed date, just an estimate of normal delivery time. The Postal Service is sending extra mailing supplies to local Post Offices so that you can pick up most of the Priority mailing supplies at most local offices.

There are some new stamps that have been issued this summer. There is a new booklet of flag stamps which shows the US flag with four different seasonal backgrounds. Unfortunately, I have sold out my supply of Seed Packet Flowers and cannot get any more. In the regular Forever stamps, I have a sheet that depicts the singer Johnny Cash. There is a nice sheet of twenty that show five different New England Lighthouses. There is an interesting sheet called Made in America; Building a Nation. The stamps are photo images of workers, many of the pictures were taken in the 1930's and 1940's. Also, I have this year's migratory bird stamp in stock. The price is still \$15.

We are getting to the end of summer and I did want to remind people that this is back-to-school season. Please be extra cautious around school buses and in areas where children may be walking to school. I look forward to assisting my customers with their mailing needs. Thank you for supporting Canterbury Post Office.

Monarch Butterfly Watch

Early September is peak migration time for Monarchs when they fly from our region all the way to Mexico to their overwintering site.

For the past several years I've been tagging Monarch butterflies as a citizen scientist for Monarch Watch at KSU. The Monarch population has decreased over the last several years, and much research is being done on this miraculous butterfly. Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed as their sole source of food. If you have milkweed growing in your yard and notice any caterpillars living on them I would be happy to raise them to the butterfly stage so they can be tagged for their trip south. Monarch caterpillars are yellow, black, and white but are <u>not</u> fuzzy. (There is another milkweed caterpillar with the same colors that is very fuzzy--the Tussock Moth.)

If you have any Monarch caterpillars you can either drop them off in a container with air holes and some milkweed leaves at *Petals in the Pines*, 126 Baptist Rd., or I will come get them. What is the Canterbury Fund?

The Canterbury Fund is a charitable trust established by Alexander Standish of Canterbury on June 10, 1966. The purpose of the Fund is to aid, financially, those Canterbury, NH residents who are in need of financial assistance due to the destruction of their homes or other hardships resulting from accident, or who have endured poor health of any member of the immediate family, or who need special education or treatment as a result of physical or mental handicaps of any member of the immediate family, or who are worthy students needing assistance for higher education. This aid is to be provided in the form of non-interest bearing cash loans without specific maturity. These loans to individuals are kept confidential.

In addition, the Fund may make grants to organizations in Canterbury to assist in the funding of community projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, are in the best interest of all Canterbury residents. As stipulated by Mr. Standish, the trustees of the fund are the trustees of the Canterbury United Community Church.

The trust also established a Canterbury Fund Loan and Grant Committee. This committee receives all requests to the fund for loans or grants. The committee makes recommendations to the trustees, who may approve or disapprove the recommendation of the committee. The Loan and Grant Committee is made up of the following organizations: the PTO, the Volunteer Fire Dept., the Ladies Benevolent Society, and the Trustees of the Elkins Fund.

Over the last 46 years since the fund was established, the fund has grown both through interest on the principal and proceeds from the Town Fair. The Fair was started by the CUCC, and is now a town-wide endeavor presently chaired by Lisa Carlson. Her phone # is 783-0335 and she always has great volunteer opportunities for those who want to help.

Canterbury has seen many changes since 1996. The Trust document allows the trustees of the fund some latitude in updating procedures. The trustees are always interested in your thoughts. Applications can be made through our Pastor, Bill Donahue, or you can contact Ron Turcotte, trustee, at 620-3717.
