It now shows one of our campsites during our three weeks of living in remote areas of southern Africa, mostly in Botswana, where the humans are few and the wildlife are many. Advice given by every park ranger as we registered for any evening was, "Do not walk away from your campsite after dark, for any reason...too dangerous." You acquire a different frame of mind in a place where you are considered food by other predators. I do believe that a primitive part of our brains comes back online, saying, whoa, we know a little about this.

Being in a place where all our human wanderings across the planet long ago likely began is also a humbling experience. When there are no buffers between yourself and the natural world in all its fierce wonder, it gives you pause.

The new screen saver photo is one I took of our camp on the banks of the Chobe River in Botswana. As my dear friend, Elizabeth Orton Jones, would say, "It's like a postcard, but you're in it!". Our tents and vehicles are set in a patch of ground that looks out over the marsh that frames the river. It's like something I have only seen on National Geographic specials during my life, but now it is part of my own life experience.

What a gift it is to travel to such a place in a life. What a wondrous thing it is to weave those stories into my life back here. As Bilbo the Hobbit did, I have been there and back again, and I am grateful for so much.

Monarch Butterfly Watch

Early September is peak migration time for Monarchs when they fly from our region all the way to Mexico to their overwintering site. For the past several years I've been tagging Monarch butterflies as a citizen scientist for Monarch Watch at KSU. The Monarch population has decreased over the last several years, and much research is being done on this miraculous butterfly.

Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed as their sole source of food. If you have milkweed growing in your yard and notice any caterpillars living on them I would be happy to raise them to the butterfly stage so they can be tagged for their trip south. Monarch caterpillars are yellow, black, and white but are not fuzzy. (There is another milkweed caterpillar with the same colors that is very fuzzy--the Tussock Moth.)

If you have any Monarch caterpillars, you can either drop them off in a container with air holes and some milkweed leaves at *Petals in the Pines*, 126 Baptist Rd., or I will come get them. Recycling Center News

As autumn quickly approaches, we are seeing an influx of materials from around the yard and garden. Please remember that we must keep organic materials separate from each other (in est, compost and leaves are not permitted in the brush pile) and inorganic materials like plastic resins, clay pots, liners and tarps, and other human-manufactured debris significantly reduce air quality if buried in the brush pile then inadvertently burned. Please be mindful of contaminants in the treasure house as well; broken items and sharps are <u>not</u> welcome. Some particularly aged and worn items are suitable for recycling rather than reuse. A volunteer or staff member can direct you if you are unsure what category your item(s) are best suited to.

Unfortunately, due to disposal laws and restrictions, we <u>cannot</u> accept smoke detectors, mercury thermometers, or liquid paints at this time. All of these have been discovered around the facility in the past month, which greatly increases the risk of soil and groundwater contamination, as well as causes additional tax burden when a licensed hazardous waste vendor has to come get it at considerable expense. PLEASE do not leave these items, we have resources we can offer, or refer you to those who can accept these wastes. Mercury-containing fluorescent bulbs and intact mercury thermostats are accepted; fees may apply. Again, please ask. We often have low-cost or even free avenues that consumers can take advantage of, but we, as a municipal entity with larger volumes, can't.

As the kids get back to school, don't forget that you can donate clothes, shoes, and textiles in any of the three boxes (One at CES and two at the transfer station) and all of the proceeds go to fund recycling activities at CES! It's easier than trucking them to Concord or Tilton, and provides an immediate educational benefit right here for Canterbury children!

There is one Federal holiday in September, so the Canterbury Post Office will be closed on Monday, September 1, to celebrate Labor Day. For the rest of the month, we will operate our normal hours.

On July 29, the public meeting regarding the changes to the Canterbury Post Office was held in the Meetinghouse. There were between 40 to 50 townspeople at the meeting. They were able to give their opinions and suggestions to a representative of the U.S. Postal Service. At this point, the results of the meeting are that the Canterbury Post Office will be open six hours per day on weekdays. The Saturday hours and schedule will not be affected. What is unknown at this time is the specific daily schedule. Another unknown is the date for the new hours to start. At some point I will receive this information and I will post it at the office.

After giving the matter considerable thought, I have decided to retire. The changes to the Canterbury Post Office would have affected both my hours and my pay rate. On top of that, the Postal Service has offered Postmasters in my situation (a post office with reduced hours) a cash incentive to retire. Given the fact that I am already in my seventies, I felt this was an opportunity that I shouldn't pass up. To receive the incentive, we needed to be retired by the end of the fiscal year, so I chose the last day and will retire on Tuesday, Sept. 30. I have no idea who will take over the office when I leave nor have I been contacted about this. The usual procedure is to post the position, get applications, choose three finalists and make a choice. Again, whenever there is some news, I will post it.

I first started working in Canterbury in September 2001. I became Postmaster in March 2005. I have strong feelings about the place of the Post Office in a small community and have tried to work in accordance with these beliefs. I have enjoyed my time here and feel satisfied with the job that I have done. I wish I had the opportunity earlier but things do have a way of working themselves out. I am looking forward to starting a new chapter and enter with few expectations. I think there will be a number of things for me to be doing and I want to stay open to whatever may come my way.

Thank you all for your support and your many complimentary words. I am glad that I was able to help so many people.

Local Leaders Complete National Service Program

Strafford, N.H. – Over the 20 years since AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC) launched in 1994, 17,000 young adults have strengthened countless communities across the nation and developed into involved citizens and leaders. Veterans, people who are homeless, people with disabilities, at-risk youth, schools, parks, disaster zones, and nonprofit organizations all benefit from the ongoing service of the 18- to 24-year-olds who dedicate 10 months of their time to the program.

Colin Evans of Canterbury, was among 480 members who graduated from AmeriCorps NCCC in late July, contributing to this ongoing legacy of service. Collectively, the July graduates completed over 800,000 hours of service and over 250 community service projects.

Each member was part of a team of about 10 diverse individuals. These teams traveled to, lived in, and completed several six- to eight-week-long projects for different communities across the Great Plains and western United States. NCCC projects support disaster relief, the environment, energy conservation, infrastructure improvement, and urban and rural development.

Evans, who arrived at NCCC's Southwest Region Campus in Denver on October 24, 2013 to begin his term of service, graduated from the program on July 29, 2014. The ceremony took place at Red Rocks Amphitheatre, tipping a hat to the NCCC's historic roots. Red Rocks Amphitheatre, opening in 1941, was built by the Depression-era Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). Fifty years later, the CCC was used as a model for the NCCC.

Before joining the NCCC, Evans attended Bishop Brady High School and Plymouth State University, where he studied Psychology. His parents are John and Deborah Evans.


