# FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends.

The screensaver photo for my laptop is a view of our campsite, and the view through it onto the expanse of marsh land through which runs the Chobe River, at the Chobe Reserve in Botswana. The land is remote. It is home to countless species of African creatures. Humans are visitors. We lived in tents that unfolded atop two Toyota 4X4 trucks. When we crept into the tents at night after burying the fire we could hear critters, some of them quite large, roaming around close by.

Motorized versions of the Conestoga wagons of our westward migration in the United States in the nineteenth century; we lived out of these vehicles, stored our belongings (a small container and a daypack for each of the eight of us for three weeks), our food, and supplies. Since they were our transportation for everything we did, we broke camp every morning and set up every evening, even if we stayed in the same campsite for a couple of nights.

When I meet with someone in my office at the Parish House I'll show the photo on my laptop. It interests me how people respond. Whether someone thinks the experience was great, and wishes to do it, or whether someone thinks it may have been interesting for me, but there is no way the person is envious of me, is clear by the person's expression. For me, the trip was a highlight of my life experiences, among the many I've been able to have. Stepping outside the usual routine, after being buffered from inconvenience and risk as we are privileged to be in our country, helps me reset my view of life. Taking less for granted is the simplest way to say it. Talking with our son, Sam, about this, he said, "Dad, being unplugged for three weeks does give you a different view of living in the bubble."

It occurs to me, though, that there are opportunities to get that different view without traveling far. Our Church's Youth Group connected with Ascentria Care Alliance two weeks ago. Since 1997 this organization, known until a few months ago as Lutheran Social Services, is the agency that enables the resettling of refugees in the Concord area from troubled nations around the world. After two orientation and introduction meetings our high school young adults are forming friendships with teens from these countries. Some of the refugee families are from African countries, others from places like Bhutan. I am very impressed and delighted that our youth chose to step outside their own comfort zones to begin this project. They have good leadership from parents, and from Lee Wald, their group leader. Mutual learning and understanding between the two communities will be meaningful, perhaps sometimes awkward and uncomfortable as well as joyful and astonishing. There are some reflections in this newsletter from members of our youth group. Don't miss them.

In the meantime, may you have the feeling and the practice of gratitude in your life for simple things during this month of Thanksgiving.

They started off with a question and answer session followed by handling a nozzle and hose line which they used to hit targets. Everyone did an outstanding job and we hope to see them when they get to adulthood and want to join the Fire Department. I always mention this time of year to change your smoke alarm batteries and check to make sure your Co detector is working. Remember, Carbon Monoxide kills. You can't see or smell it. As we move into winter, make sure your chimneys are cleaned and your appliance is hooked up properly and there are no leaks around pipes. We are always happy to come out and check if you think you may have a problem. The roads will start to slick up with the fallen leaves and the frosty mornings; please use caution when driving. Many people are walking and kids are on their way to school. Thank you for your continued support.

Now that the bathing suits are packed away, you may be thinking that it's hibernation time. Not even close! New England has a lot to offer in the winter and NOW is the time to prepare for it. Six weeks before you hit the slopes or the ice is the ideal time to condition your body to what lies ahead. Listed below are the areas to focus on and some exercise ideas to go with them.

- Total Body Strength-Lots of muscles are needed to get you down that mountain or over that ice, including glutes, quads, hamstrings, and core.
- 2. Flexibility- especially in the spine and hips
- 3. Balance
- Cardiovascular if your sport has short bursts of activity, make sure to train your anaerobic system. If you are working for long periods of time, focus on the anaerobic system.

Some great exercises to include:

Walking lunges Box jumps Squats and single leg squats Burpees

Plank to side plank
Side lying spine twist
Single leg dead lift
Kneeling hip flexor stretch

Standing hamstring and calf stretch

Standing quad stretch

Hiking, running, fast walking, biking

# HISTORICAL SOCIETY MAKING PROGRESS ON TOWN HISTORY

Town History Committee members, Lois Scribner, Mark Travis, Sam Papps, Pam Smarling, Stephanie Jackson, and Bob Scarponi have identified critical tasks that must be accomplished leading to the publication of our new history covering the period circa 1900 to circa 2014. The group is working to develop resources and information as required by Kathryn Grover, the writer engaged to write the history. In early October, Sam Papps conducted a tour and answered questions about our Archives Collection for Ms. Grover and reviewed resources housed in the Elkins Library. Next day, Ms. Grover met with town officials at the Sam Lake House where she was shown and discussed historic records with Ben Bynum and Mandy Irving.


