FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

We're at the point in winter when general weariness marks our faces. The seasonal tasks of frequent mornings of ice scraping and snow removal preface our travel to work. The simple chores of daily life take longer, and become somewhat more tedious. The marvel of the snow cloaked trees, shrubs and roads eases the hardship of winter work, but not always enough to ease our complaining spirits.

February is the longest month with the fewest days. For us in Canterbury, last winter, beginning about now, was a long season of saying goodbye to many in our community who died. It seemed that every week held news of a new death. And yet, it seemed to me that these sorrowful events prompted us to call upon the best in ourselves as we gathered around each other, consoling and remembering and loving. It made a remarkable impression on me in my earliest days here to watch how well you did this work.

It is perhaps trite to say, but life near and far gives us ample opportunity to bemoan the sad and tragic events of our common life. How we respond to them makes all the difference. Remembrance of love shared, appreciation of the wondrous life yet before us, and the possibility of unexpected joy, these are things that strengthen us for the days ahead.

When we are tempted to opt for easy answers to difficult issues, and especially when we are fearful and unthinking, it might be a good thing to ponder the blessings of the past and the present, and engage with gratitude this life, today, even as we scrape the car windshield.

Post Office News

In February, there is one Federal holiday. The Canterbury Post Office will be closed on Monday, February 17, 2014. The rest of the month, we will be open our normal business hours.

On January 26, the US Postal Service changed postal rates. The price of a stamp to mail a one ounce letter is now 49 cents. A book of twenty stamps will now be \$9.80. Since these are Forever stamps, the new price will not be printed on the stamp. The price of a postcard stamp went up one cent, so mailing a postcard now costs 34 cents. On the overweight letters each extra ounce costs 21 cents up to 3.5 ounces. The price of international stamps went up 5 cents so that the global forever stamps are now \$1.15.

The domestic priority flat-rate envelopes, small flat-rate boxes, and both medium flat- rate boxes all stayed the same. The Priority large flat-rate box went up to \$17.45. The domestic Priority Mail Express flat-rate envelopes went up to \$19.99, an increase of 4 cents. Fees for most extra services, such as certified, return receipt, insurance, and money orders, also increased.

I have begun to receive some of the new Forever stamps. I have this year's lunar New Year issue. It is for the Year of the Horse and shows oriental drums. The new Love stamps are out. They are red and pink and show cut paper hearts. I still have some of the Harry Potter booklets, which have 20 different scenes from the Harry Potter movies.

The temperature is in the forties as I write this. It is nice, but I'm sure we have more winter weather on the way. Please keep in mind that inclement weather does make mail delivery much more difficult. I hope there won't be any major problems.

I look forward to helping you with your postal business. Thank you for supporting your local Post Office.

This notice is to help 4-H families plan ahead. Questions may be referred to Ruth Mann at 783-9886.



If you have one of these chests, or something like it that can close and only be opened from the outside, please, get rid of it or fix it so this will never happen to your family. This was a very tragic story and avoidable if we only remember to check these type of things in our homes. I always remember my parents telling me about never getting into an old fridge or freezer chest because you may not be able to get out. That has stuck with me, my entire life. I think the thing to do when we hear of these tragic stories, is to act on it and get the word out so these things will not happen.

In keeping with the caution theme, make sure to check your Co detectors to make sure they are working. If they take batteries, change them out.

I would like to thank you for pulling over for us when we are responding to calls. I have noticed, for the most part, everyone is doing that for us. With all the ice storms and bad road conditions, it really gives us room to maneuver.

I will be bringing smoke alarms to town meeting if anyone should need any. Please be safe, drive carefully and we will see you at town meeting in March.

Canterbury Shaker Village Awarded \$150,000 LCHIP Grant to Restore Trustees' Office

Canterbury Shaker Village was recently awarded a \$150,000 Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) grant for the purpose of renovating and restoring the Shaker Trustees' Office. The award of these funds, which requires a oneto-one match, officially kicks off a fundraising effort to raise the additional \$208,000 to complete the project.

The Trustees' Office is one of the most important structures of the 30 buildings within the 694 acre historic National Historic Landmark of Canterbury Shaker Village, and is part of the Shaker Village Historic District created by the Town of Canterbury in 1994. The Trustees' Office is situated along Shaker Road, one of New Hampshire's first designated scenic and cultural byways. Many in town may remember being greeted by Eldress Bertha in the front hall of the Trustees' Office.

The restoration and renovation of the Trustees' Office represents the culmination of the significant building restoration efforts at Canterbury Shaker Village. Programmatically, it offers the rare and meaningful opportunity to interpret the scale and scope of the Shakers 200-year legacy of entrepreneurship, innovative design and simple living to the world in an authentic space.

The restoration and renovation project will consolidate the museum's offices and create program and exhibit spaces on the main floor, provide overnight accommodations for workshop participants and lecturers on the second floor, provide collections storage on the top floor, and create a rental apartment in the lower level with a centralized area for housekeeping. The total cost of the project is \$358,000 and will rely on a combination of private donations and additional grant funding to match the LCHIP funds.

The Trustee's Office was designed as the hub of the Canterbury Shakers' considerable commercial enterprises and was continually in use from 1831-1990. Here, they executed contracts for their inventions and manufactured goods (such as washing machines, medicines, seed packets and other dry goods), housed guests and clients who arrived from distant places, and met with townspeople and local officials to discuss civic matters. The Trustees' Office has national significance as one of the best examples of Shaker architecture surviving in any of the original 19 Shaker communities from Maine to Kentucky. The four-story, 22-room building—the only masonry building at Canterbury Shaker Village—contains numerous technological or building features that were advanced for the 1830s and retains many features not found in other Shaker buildings or in domestic structures of the time period.
