The annual CES <u>Graham P. Chynoweth Spelling Bee</u> will be held on Thursday, January 30th at 1:30 in the school gym. The winner of our local Bee will go on to compete with other fifth through eighth grade winners at the NH state level Bee in March. Grade level bees will be held throughout the month of January.

There are three "No School" days in January. School will be closed on Wednesday, January 1st for New Year's Day and on Monday, January 20th in recognition of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. January 24th is a staff in-service day and there will be no school for students.

The NH Department of Education will release the 2012 New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) data at the end of this month. Information about Shaker schools and other state schools will be available to the public at the department's website http://www.ed.state.nh.us. Parents will receive individual assessment reports for students in grade 3-8 and 11 in reading and mathematics, and for students in grades 5, 8, and 11 in writing. Parents and community members are welcome to contact the school for additional information about the state assessment and our school's results. This will be the last time CES students will take the NECAP. The state is transferring to the Smarter Balanced Test that will be administered in the spring of 2015. This will be an adaptive, computerized assessment aligned with the Common Core State Standards. Post Office News

There are two Federal holidays in January. Canterbury Post Office will be closed Wednesday, January 1, New Year's Day. We also will be closed on Monday, January 20, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. On New Year's Eve, December 31, Canterbury Post Office will be open half the day, closing at noon that day. For the rest of the month, we will operate our normal schedule.

The United States Postal Service has approval from the Postal Rate Commission to raise rates on Jan. 26, 2014. The plan is to raise stamp prices to 49 cents for a one ounce letter. All other rates will be affected by this change. The change is subject to Congressional review and modification. At this time, I do not have a chart with postal rates. I should have all of that available by the February newsletter. The good news is, all the Forever stamps will be good after the rate change. You won't notice the new rates until you go to buy more stamps after Jan. 26.

As I am writing this I am listening to reports of a snowstorm coming our way. I wanted to remind people that get mail delivery at their house that they should keep their mailbox clear so that the carriers can deliver the mail without getting out of their vehicles. Those that get their mail at a Post Office Box don't have to worry about this.

Transfer Station and Recycling Center Updates:

PLEASE BE MINDFUL...

When you are filling your green PAYT trash bags: the bags are rated by the manufacturer to hold 20 lbs and 45 lbs of trash respectively. If you are overloading your bags such that you cannot lift them out of your car or carry them over to the truck, please do not expect staff to lift them either. We are only human, and although we try our best to help you with your materials we will not lift far in excess of what is reasonable and safe. All trash should fit inside the green bag, and you should be able to tie it closed; if your trash is sticking out of the top of your green bag by a foot or more then you need to use another bag.

Please do not put ANY electronics or fluorescent bulbs or fluorescent light fixtures in your trash! These are hazardous items. It is ILLEGAL to deposit them in the trash at a transfer station or incinerator and you can be fined up to \$3,000 per offense. We have low-cost and free options for disposing of many items, just ask us!

You might also have seen our sign: Green Bags or Green \$\$\$! Please, also understand that we must charge for trash not in green bags. Even if you are buying new ones, you must pay for what you are throwing away. This is the only way the system remains fair and equitable for all residents. If you have thrown away items and neglected to pay, please be advised that drive-offs and unpaid accounts will be turned over to law enforcement officials for collection. If you are known to us, you may have received a letter asking for payment. If all we have is your vehicle description and license plate then we have no way to contact you regarding outstanding amounts and the only option left to us on seriously overdue accounts is through legal means. If you think you may owe on an account, please contact us and make payment no later than January 31st, 2014. After January 31st, 2014 charges of theft and/or illegal dumping may be charged.

Thank you for another great year of excellent recycling! Through your diligent efforts we again have a stellar (>50%) recycling rate for residents using the transfer station, as well as an active composting program and lots of reuse through treasure-house operations! Bravo to all our great volunteers and residents for such excellent participation!

Local hero serves in 20th class of AmeriCorps NCCC

STRAFFORD, N.H. Colin Evans of Canterbury recently began a 10-month term of service in the National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC), an AmeriCorps program. Evans, based out of the regional campus in Denver, is beginning his first projects during the week of November 14.

Founded in 1994, AmeriCorps NCCC is a residential national service program that supports disaster relief, the environment, infrastructure improvement, energy conservation, and urban and rural development. Over the past 20 years, 820,000 Americans have served over 1 billion hours across the family of AmeriCorps programs. Currently, about 80,000 people serve in AmeriCorps programs nationwide each year, about 2,500 of whom serve with AmeriCorps NCCC.

Evans arrived at his regional campus in late October to begin training. This training, which prepared him for 10 months of full-time service with AmeriCorps NCCC, emphasized teamwork, leadership development, communication, service learning, and certification by the American Red Cross.

As a Corps Member, Evans will be responsible for completing a series of six- to eight-week-long service projects as part of a 10- to 12-person team. Their first service projects will end on December 19, at which time his teams will break for the winter holidays and begin a new project in a new location in January.

Fifty-six teams composed of over 600 Corps Members and Team Leaders began service projects in November throughout the Pacific and Southwest regions, based in Sacramento and Denver respectively. Some of these projects include providing services to homeless clients at Sacramento Loaves and Fishes, completing environmental restoration projects in Death Valley National Park, supporting a nature reserve in Missouri and a children's hospital in Arkansas, and assisting with flood recovery in northern Colorado, among others.

Before joining the NCCC, Evans attended Bishop Brady High School and Plymouth State University, where he studied Psychology. Evans said, "I chose to commit to a term of national service to gain experience working with others and to learn about the needs people require outside my state." Colin is the son of John and Deborah Evans.

AmeriCorps NCCC members, all 18 to 24 years old, complete at least 1,700 hours of service during the 10-month program. In exchange for their service, they receive \$5,550 to help pay for college. Other benefits include a small living stipend, room and board, leadership development, team building skills, and the knowledge that, through active citizenship, they can indeed make a difference.
