## FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

One of the delights of Christmas is the gathering of young adults who journey home for vacations to the place where they grew up. Whenever they are able to accompany family to services, especially on Christmas Eve and the Sundays that surround it, I love to meet them, and to hear their transformed views of a familiar place. I meet most of them for the first time. They've been away at college, work or the military for longer than I've been pastor here. Even so, it's possible to see a deepening in their thoughtful comments, or their guiet smiles during the time of gathering.

The community responds as well, of course. Parents and their contemporaries look with fond pride on the ones they have raised up, and sent off. The most common response from parents seems to be words expressing how precious this time is, this brief time of visiting before our children journey back to the homes they are making for themselves.

Homecoming is one of the most common themes in the scriptures, especially the stories of Jesus's birth. This is no cute story for young children, only. It is full of terror, confusion, long journeys and seeking love. It has hard working people who are struggling with making a living. It has a cruel, insecure, tyrannical king. It has wise humans in the magi. It has a mother and a father caring, as best they can, for their new infant son.

Speaking with some of us recently, it seemed to me that the church at its best is the place where we can sort out the different challenges or our lives. Elders can speak of increasing frailty, considerable experience, and a long view of life. Young adults can assert their new, growing selves within the security of loving community. Parents, ah, parents can commiserate and celebrate with each other about the daunting task of being true to themselves while raising up their children, daily setting aside their own interests to take on the interests of their children.

Our congregation, a small one in a small town, has an air of closeness and intimacy that enables this conversation to occur in a graceful way, respectful of privacy, but knowing that a community of fellow seekers is present for company on the journey.

No matter what your place in life may be at this moment, we invite you to join us for the conversation on Sunday mornings at 10. Peace.

### A Light for Zimbabwe

I returned in late December from 7 weeks in Chikore, Zimbabwe. Currently we sponsor 29 children in Primary School and 25 in Secondary school plus 11 more who wrote their final exams and are awaiting results this month. Exam results will determine those who might be college candidates and those who will seek a trade. These decisions are also dependent on available funding. We have 5 students currently in colleges studying law, teaching, and accounting. As they graduate, we will accommodate more. The cost for college has increased to about \$1500 a year.

A dam is now complete with grant money from GZA Environmental, This will dramatically improve water supply and access for 3 villages. A large carpentry building has been electrified permitting the co-op members the ability to use power tools and to provide apprenticeships to some of our graduates.

We are currently building a small house for two new boys who have been double orphans for 3 years and have no permanent home as their hut was leaking and falling down. They were dependent on sympathetic neighbors but have had no consistent food, schooling, or supervision. We have found sponsors for them and hired a village woman for a stipend to oversee the project and their well being.

With gratitude for all that we have and take for granted, and for the opportunity to make a difference.

Mail can only be accepted and/or packages distributed during hours of operation.

The United States Postal Service (USPS) has an agreement with both United Parcel Service (UPS) and Federal Express (FedEx) to deliver parcels which were accepted for delivery by them. The USPS does not accept, at the window, any items which are postage paid thru UPS or FedEx.

Any questions regarding mail delivery to your home or business within the town of Canterbury should be directed to the Tilton Post Office (603) 286-4592. The rural carriers who deliver mail in Canterbury work from the Tilton Post Office. The Postmaster of the Tilton Post Office now manages the Canterbury Post Office which shall be staffed with a clerk not a postmaster. Packages, Registered Mail, Certified Mail or any held mail will still be available for collection at the Canterbury Post Office if initial delivery cannot be made by your rural carrier.

I have a few things to remind everyone of;

1. Town elections are Tuesday March 10th from 7:00 am until 7:00 pm at the old town hall. The voter ID law is still in effect so please bring a photo ID with you.

The meeting portion will be Friday March 13th, starting at 7:00 pm, at the Canterbury Elementary School on Baptist Road.

- 2. If you pay your taxes *after* the due date, please check online at <u>canterbury-nh.org</u> or call us because interest accrued changes on a daily basis.
- 3. When transferring motor vehicle plates, we are required to turn in the registration from the vehicle that the plates came from. When you trade or sell your old vehicle, the registration is legally yours, so keep it for your records in case you end up transferring plates.

### **Recycling Center**

As I total year-end figures on recycling and trash (the industry runs 4-6 weeks behind with brokers and multiple vendors) I am prompted to remind you of the considerable cost savings of active participation in the recycling program. Trash was up nearly 4% in 2014, the first definitive increase since we enacted PAYT in 2006, and recycling is down (see the town report for more info): it's clear that Canterbury is throwing away more and recycling less. It saves you money and has clear environmental benefits to be vigilant in your recycling efforts so I encourage everyone to do an audit of your home system and evaluate if it is meeting your family's needs.

Please be mindful in preparing materials for an expedient drop-off: plastic screw-caps can be recycled, but they have to come off of bottles. Especially in cold weather, they get stuck and we have to fight to remove them, sometimes they won't budge and the whole container gets trashed instead of recycled: try using a coffee can to collect caps and empty it when you come visit us! Evaluate if your current home system of mixed containers is causing too much time sorting or mixups putting materials on the wrong trays: we try to keep traffic moving through the facility at a good pace, but when we have huge piles of contaminated/mixed recycling we simply can't process it as quickly. Do your bins overflow or is there barely anything in them? Does everyone in your home know what goes where? Are bins labeled and easily accessible so guests can tell also? 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
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### **CUCC YOUTH GROUP FUN**
