A Marine friend from Vietnam called me about 6 weeks ago. He was walking the beach in San Diego, on a visit to his daughter. Doc, he said, the reunion this year is at Shockley's Farm, as usual, in Conway, Missouri. It's on the weekend of October 3-4. I'll be there early, just letting you know.

I had never attended this reunion. This was to be the 5th Annual Reunion of Combined Action Platoon 2-7-10, a Marine squad of 8 Marines and a Corpsman (me) who served together 45 years ago. However, something in Luis Martinez's voice, and inside me I suppose, said, I think I'll go.

For three and half days I lived on Shockley's Farm with those men, and four of their wives. The agenda was simple. Eat, drink coffee, and be with each other. There was nothing else to do. And, we did this, with never a lull in the conversation. It was as though no time had passed, and required no recovery.

I do believe that a congregation, at its very best, offers this to its members, friends and the community. Unstated caring is at the core of our life. If it isn't, we have lost our way. The Executive Officer of our company, who looked out for ten such teams as my own, wrote to me when I told him how the reunion had been. He couldn't attend. He said, "It must have been great to simply open the curtain to some of our quiet thoughts with folks you know still have your back. Humbling indeed....and more than a little lucky."


