FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

When Karen and I lived in Dover, NH in the early 1970's we were active at First Parish Church. The pastor, Art Domingue, preached extemporaneously every week. It was years before I attended theological school, but I liked his way of speaking, and I thought if I ever worked in a job, self to familiarity between listeners and the speaker. It enables the speaker to register the impact of the spoken word as the listeners' expressions vary. Smiles and frowns are evident. Excitement and boredom can be read clearly. Glazed eyes can be noticed before the stage of snoring is reached. Affection between speaker and listeners prompts respect. Practicing affection mindfully enables patience, forgiveness, and humility, features that are necessary for community life to be sustained.

Art once said that the sermon needs to be part of the ongoing conversation with the community during the rest of the week. Since I began working in Canterbury in September, 2012 I have received more active responses to my sermons than in any other time in 36 years of parish ministry. You have engaged me in many ongoing conversations. And, many of you have shared with me copies of essays and books that relate to subjects we discuss. Stacks of these adorn my study at home.

While pondering a writing task several days ago, I remembered a copy of an essay by farmer, poet, essayist, novelist and environmentalist, Wendell Berry, given to me in the fall of 2012. "It All Turns on Affection". I needed to return to that essay, but I had forgotten where I'd put it (a careful place, no doubt). Fortunately, memory served me well, and I found the essay within a couple of minutes.

Affection is the ingredient that holds families and communities together, sustaining them. Berry says that this is the most important part of what it means to be human, and without it we are wandering, mobile seekers after one stimulating and distracting thing after another. If done to excess, Berry says doing it at all, we give affection to things which destroy, and this is wrong. Berry says that the word "affection and the terms of value that cluster around it – love, care, sympathy, mercy, forbearance, respect, reverence – have histories and meanings that raise the issue of worth. We should give our affection to things that are true, just, and beautiful."

Affection is given and received, we learn how, in small communities that are sustainable. To be sustainable we need to honor two cycles, the fertility cycle of birth, growth, maturity and death, in harmony with a cultural cycle. The cultural cycle is an unending conversation between old people and young people. "The fertility cycle turns by the law of nature. The cultural cycle turns on affection."

As we feel ourselves stretched too thin by our schedules, full of many things that are essentially good, but straining every day the weave of affection in our families by the sheer weight of them, I wonder if we are indeed doing violence to ourselves, having lost the art of continuous conversation between people of all ages.

I invite you to join us for this conversation at Canterbury United Community Church, or by other means in our community, at nightly supper tables, and in the center of town gathering places. This is not an issue for church people only. If we care at all for the life of this community, this small and intimate gem of humaneness, then this conversation requires our attention, our affection.

What's the News with the Courageous Exploring Scholars?

As you may have heard, this year, the Courageous Exploring Scholars (students in Mrs. Wieck's, Mrs. Cameron's and Mrs. Briggs' classrooms) have been working on moving towards personalized learning. We have been working on learning progressions, with a focus on math. Learning Progressions are the pathways to our learning that we follow. We have been working in groups based on which progression (or target) we need to start with.

On January 19th we had yet another Compass Conversation. In this one, we showed a small math skit made by the Courageous Exploring Scholars called Math Maneuvers. It's a big board that is played like Candyland. In the game, you roll a die and whatever number you roll you move up that many spaces. It showed our families how learning progressions work.

We have also started using a Proficiency Scale to show where we are in our learning. This scale takes the place of our grades and we think of it as climbing a mountain. The proficiency scale has four points. A 1 is "I am ready to begin the journey but I am not able to do this, even with help.". A 2 is "I am progressing towards this learning goal, I still have concepts to master but I can do it with help". A 3 is "I am proficient at this, I understand and have mastered this goal". And finally, a 4 is "I am an expert! I can apply and extend my learning. I can teach this to others".

We are excited about our learning and would love to share it with everyone!

TRUSTEES HOLD SUCCESSFUL PLANNING SESSION

The annual strategic planning meeting was held on Saturday, January 23rd. A thorough review of accomplishments achieved in 2015 was done, along with a review of outstanding issues to be addressed in 2016.

TOWN HISTORY PROJECT ON SCHEDULE AND MOVING AHEAD

Kathryn Grover, our writer, has submitted her outline of the book to the town history book committee for review and comment. A sub-committee chaired by Mark Travis will conduct the review and make recommendations to Ms. Grover by March 4th. The first draft of the manuscript is expected by mid-July. Plans call for publication of the book in June of 2017.

RESIDENT INTERVIEWS CONTINUE

The book committee members and volunteers continue to conduct interviews with Canterbury residents (and others) even as we continue to develop the writing of the history. All interviews are recorded and transcribed for placement in the historical society's archives.

FUNDRAISING RESULTS TO DATE

At newsletter press time the history book finance committee, chaired by Tyson Miller, has raised \$68,934.00 or 92% of the goal of \$75,000. Donations are still being accepted at P.O. Box 81, Canterbury, N.H. 03224 (note "book project" on the check).

Shaker Village Happenings



Shaker Dance Revival Project

On February 3, Canterbury Shaker Village announced the Shaker Dance Revival Project, a strategic program that honors the Shakers' use of dance in worship while rethinking tradition for contemporary audiences and dancers. The first component of the Shaker Dance Revival Project is the Summer Dance Intensive, a six-day

immersion program for pre-professional dancers ages 15 and up. Additional elements of the Shaker Dance Revival Project will include signature dance performances on August 5 and 6 as part of Village Rising, as well as other dance-themed programs and events this spring.

The Village has contracted with Dancer and Choreographer Lorraine Chapman to coordinate the Shaker Dance Revival Project. Chapman danced professionally in Canada and with Feld Ballets/NY and was cited as a choreographer and dancer by Dance Magazine as a "25 To Watch". She currently directs and dances for her own company—Lorraine Chapman The Company (LCTC)—as well as teaching for the Boston Conservatory.

The Summer Dance Intensive, which will take place June 22-24 and June 27-29, is one key component of the Shaker Dance Revival Project. Set among the expansive historic beauty of Canterbury Shaker Village, the program is designed to provide rigorous training from high caliber dance instructors in a range of disciplines, including ballet and a variety of contemporary dance techniques and modern modalities, while also providing an opportunity to learn about and connect with the Shaker legacy. Dancers can choose to sign up for three or six days. The cost to attend is \$200 for one session or \$400 for the full six days. Village members and those participants who register for both sessions by March 6 will receive an additional discount.

A Waterfall Walk

Did you know that there's a large waterfall (15' high?) just a short distance from Baptist Road? It's spectacular at high water — roaring and creating clouds of spray. Best visited in Spring when the flow is greatest and the poison ivy hasn't come up yet, its ice formations can also be rewarding to the more adventurous.

At the East end of Baptist Road, park at the pull off near the bridge at Peverly Swamp. Hike on the left - east – side of the stream. About half way to the falls there's a substantial saw mill dam – the break in the middle would have been where an undershot water wheel was located. At maximum flow, the water hits a large rock as it pours through the opening, creating an impressive rooster tail. Below the dam the stream wanders through large boulders, slippery with moss. Avoid the upcoming top of the falls, and be very careful on the sides of the gorge below it – steep and very slippery with deep leaf layer. With care, you can reach the base of the falls, feel the spray and hear the full roar of the water. Hiking poles needed going down into the gorge.

Canterbury Recycling

Canterbury has long had a day in the spring when the annual Townwide Roadside Cleanup took place. But once the town adopted 'pay as you throw' in 2006, the Canterbury Recycling Committee realized that participation might drop off, as civic-minded volunteers might think twice about having to buy additional green bags for the privilege of disposing of other people's trash. Hence the introduction of the 'blue bags' program in Canterbury, in conjunction with New Hampshire the Beautiful and the Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRA). Operating completely on the honor system, the Transfer Station distributes bags to those individuals who request them, not just for the annual cleanup, but year-round.

In the ten years since then, participation in the annual cleanup has been terrific. Lots of people contact me to let me know where they'll be picking up litter, and even more participate. Lots of other things have happened in those years as well: volunteers have moved out of Canterbury, new people have moved in, and the kids who enthusiastically treated the litter cleanup as either a treasure hunt or a contest to see who could fill the most bags are not so little anymore.

I know that there are still many people participating. The problem is. I don't know who, and more importantly, where they are. In the past, I've contacted the volunteers who worked on a stretch the year before, and asked them if they'd do it again, and usually I heard back. But the list is getting a little stale, so I think it's time to start a new list. So what I'm hoping is that you'll reach out to me and let me know what stretch of road you want to do. If you have a specific stretch (most people choose the road in front of their house), let me know what that is, preferably by describing it like this 'from 66 Center Road to the center of town', rather than 'from my house to the Andersons'. And if you don't have a specific road in mind, describe what you do want, as in 'There's never any trash on my road, so I'd really like to take a stretch where there's a lot of litter', or 'I want my kids to participate, but we need to stay away from traffic'.

This will be first come, first served for a stretch. And if I hear from you before March 13th, I can provide an update in next month's newsletter about which streets still need some caring volunteers. You can either email me at mattieandriley@yahoo.com, or call me at 783-9360.
