FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

This morning I attended the Memorial Day Ceremony at the Canterbury Elementary School. It was different and it was helpful, and to say it was meaningful would be to understate seriously.

Usually the crowd of parents, students and teachers gathers on the town common and each of the classes presents a song, or a poem, or reflection on the meaning of the day. Today there was a problem with electricity, and with no sound system the school staff wisely decided to shift the event into the school auditorium.

We are a community that cares deeply for our children. Eager to encourage them, we usually applaud loudly for every song and recitation. Today all was silent. Our children approached in silence except for the haunting melody of a single piper leading the way. They processed into the room and set up, class by class, in their usual places on the floor before the stage. The band members solemnly assumed their seats. All was still.

The silence continued.

The tone was set. For the entire remembrance we sat in silence, hearing the deep, solemn seriousness of the words spoken and sung. Wars are fought. We are free because of countless people who gave their lives to make it so. Families are missing sons and daughters. We hope for a time when such suffering will not be necessary, when humankind outgrows its need to resolve differences with the slaughter of war.

The silence deepened and it prompted me to think of all the children I saw die in my brief year serving in just one war. Whether they are children who are born in a place where war is fought, or they are far away grieving a parent who will not return, the innocent children of this world bear the burden.

However necessary a war may be, it is not possible to romanticize or to glorify war when we look at their faces.

The silence continued, and the recitation of Flanders Fields and the Gettysburg Address was incredibly powerful.

The hope for enduring peace is an ancient human longing. And the last verse of Isaiah 11:6 says, "...and a little child shall lead them." This morning our children led us, and we sat still and listened. And, the piper led them out of the hall, to Taps, and Amazing Grace.

No applause, but tears and gratitude abounded.

For the staff and students of Canterbury Elementary School I am deeply grateful. Peace be with you.

Shaker Village Happenings

Canterbury Shaker Village is now open daily and the 2016 season heralds a new focus on daily programming. From mid-June through October, daily visitors will have the opportunity to learn about a different aspect of Shaker life depending upon the day of their visit. Self-guided materials will encourage visitors to explore these daily themes throughout the Village.

Monday, Wednesday, Friday will feature Brethren industries and related demonstrations including broom making, printing and woodworking.

Tuesday and Thursday will highlight Sister industries and related demonstrations such as rug hooking and braiding, weaving, spinning, poplarware and sewing.

Saturdays will offer family-friendly programming that explores the lives of children raised in the Village. A rotating schedule of different hands-on activities and crafts will encourage younger visitors to immerse themselves in Shaker history.

Sundays, traditionally a day of spirituality and reflection for the Shakers, will explore themes relating to community life and the Shakers' legacy. Visit the Shaker Organic Garden to see what's in season and learn about Shaker foodways in the Dwelling House Bake Room.

There are several special events and workshops in June worth noting including:

Plant Sale on Saturday June, 4 from 10:00am-2:00pm. A variety of garden perennials and annual veggies will be available for sale with proceeds benefiting the Village.

"Medicinal Plant Walk" on Sunday, June 12 from 10:00amnoon. Clinical Herbalist and Wild Forager Sara Woods will
lead participants on a gentle jaunt through the forests and
fields of Canterbury Shaker Village in search of medicinal
plants. Our backyards are full of medicine – come explore
the fields and forest to discover what Mother Earth has
provided. Sara will introduce participants to medicinal plants
commonly found in New Hampshire and discuss the best
way to prepare them for use. Bring comfortable hiking
shoes, a pen and notebook to take notes, and your
enthusiasm for the exploring the outdoors. Cost to attend is
\$20 for Village members and \$25 for non-members.

Canterbury Recycling Center

Remember when graduation week was just graduation day, or when Motorcycle Week was just Motorcycle Weekend? In a similar fashion, Canterbury couldn't limit itself to just one day for roadside cleanup.

On Saturday April 16th, and the unseasonably warm days before and after, more than 50 residents cleaned both sides of more than 37 miles of Canterbury's roads. And the following Saturday, the Conservation Commission and volunteers from the Sierra Club tackled the Riverland Conservation area, picking up more litter, as well as inspecting the state of the infrastructure and the incursion of invasive species.

As a result of all of these efforts, we collected more than 100 blue bags of roadside litter, two-thirds of it recyclable. A special thanks to Chuck and the rest of the crew at the Transfer Station for distributing the blue bags, keeping count of what came back, separating the recyclables, and dealing with all the non-baggable litter.

Not that we knew it at the time, but this final effort of the now-disbanded Canterbury Recycling Committee was a tremendous success. Thanks to everyone who participated, and will continue to do so year-round.

A Short Hike with a Long History

I'm always surprised to bump into people who have lived in Canterbury for a long time and that have never taken the short hike down to the Hannah Dustin (also spelled Duston) monument. The monument is located on a small island where the Merrimack and Contoocook Rivers converge, near the point where the townships of Canterbury, Boscawen, and Penacook/Concord all meet.

To see this monument, park in the Park 'n Ride parking lot in Boscawen, just over the Merrimack River bridge off of I-93 exit #17. Read the State historical marker sign, and then follow the footpath that begins in the southwest corner of this parking lot. Calling it a 'hike' to this monument is a bit of an overstatement; it is a relatively easy downhill walk of less than a ¼ mile on a mostly nice path. You won't need a backpack of hiking essentials, but you may want to bring a camera. The path does go across an old railroad trestle bridge which could be tricky for small children or women in high heels, and of course it is uphill on the way back out.

Before you hike into this monument, you may want to read up on the full story of Hannah Dustin. The condensed version is that she, her 6-day old baby Martha, and her nurse Mary Neff were kidnapped by Indians in Haverhill Mass., on March 15, 1697 during the French and Indian War. After several days on a forced run north into New Hampshire, the Indians and their prisoners ended up on this small island. It was on this island Hannah Dustin slipped her bonds, executed her captors, and escaped back down the river in a stolen canoe.

Supposedly, this tall impressive monument stands on the spot where the massacre occurred. Its location on this otherwise undeveloped and sometimes unkempt island adds to its majesty, but it is also an easy target for vandals. And while the monument can be described as impressive and majestic, the engraved writing on the base of the statue strikes me as un-understandable pompous drivel by someone who had been hitting the hard cider too heavily.

If you live in Canterbury and have never hiked down to see this monument, you probably should. Read the engraved text on the pedestal and see if you agree with me. And don't go in the evening unless you want to be eaten alive by mosquitoes and blackflies.

Congratulations to the Belmont High School Track and Field Team. They competed in the Division III track and field championship. Belmont Men (45 points), which had a win from Eli Allman in the 110 hurdles (15.75), finished fourth. Belmont Women (23 points) finished eighth overall.

For the men, Ian Remenar (second 300 hurdles), Kyle Gelinas (third 1,600), Allman (fourth 300 hurdles), Adam Sojka (sixth triple jump), the second-place 4x100 (River Mathieu, Colby Leroux, Marc Forgione and Allman) and second-place 4x400 (Leroux, Gelinas, Nick Randos and Remenar) completed Belmont's scoring.

For the women, Belmont was led by a victory in the 4x800 (10:32) from Alexus Day, Emma Chase, Jessica Hutchinson and Jasmine Syed (sixth 800). Freshman Alice Riley (second 3,200, fourth 1,600) also scored for Belmont.



High School Senior **Charlie Witham** said he was "shocked" when he won the Congressional Art Award for the state's 1st Congressional District.

Witham entered his oil-on-canvas self-portrait "Fly Free" as one of about 30 students who hoped for the chance to have their artwork on display for a year in the Cannon Tunnel that runs underground between the U.S. Congress and the Library of Congress in the nation's capital.

A black-and-white painting of himself with three purple finches flying free near his head, Witham said Congressman Frank Guinta (R-NH) told him that it was one of the most loved paintings of his New Hampshire staff.

Judging was done by the New Hampshire School of Art, and, along with a college scholarship, Witham will be flown along with a guest to Washington, D.C., and given a personal tour by Guinta

"I like painting in black and white with a splash of color," said Witham, adding that he is most influenced by Maine artist Rob Sullivan who taught at one point in his life at the New Hampshire Art Institute. "I love purple. It's so rich and vibrant."

Of all of the artist mediums, he prefers oils. He stretches his own canvases – something he credits art teacher Joseph Cilley with teaching him. Witham also credits his classmates in his art classes with providing him support, constructive criticism and friendship.

Mostly, he credits his family. He said his mother and his grandmother are both artists and both taught art at one point in their lives. The photograph of him that he used as an image of himself for "Fly Free" was from one taken by his sister. "My mom is a huge support," Witham said. "She's one of my biggest influences in my life, my rock and my biggest critic."

Witham said his "fourth great-grandfather" was Danial Chester French, who was an Exeter artist who was well-known in his own right and one of two designers of the statue of Abraham Lincoln in the Lincoln Memorial.

For his future, he hopes to become an artist whose works are shown in museums and art shows. An honor student, Witham is torn between the New Hampshire Institute of Art and the Maine College of Art, but knows he wants to stay local.

What is the Canterbury Fund?

The Canterbury Fund is a charitable trust established by Alexander Standish of Canterbury on June 10, 1966. The purpose of the Fund is to aid, financially, those Canterbury, NH residents who are in need of financial assistance due to the destruction of their homes or other hardships resulting from accident, or who have endured poor health of any member of the immediate family, or who need special education or treatment as a result of physical or mental handicaps of any member of the immediate family, or who are worthy students needing assistance for higher education. This aid is to be provided in the form of non-interest bearing cash loans without specific maturity. These loans to individuals are kept confidential.

In addition, the Fund may make grants to organizations in Canterbury to assist in the funding of community projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, are in the best interest of all Canterbury residents. As stipulated by Mr. Standish, the trustees of the fund are the trustees of the Canterbury United Community Church.

The trust also established a Canterbury Fund Loan and Grant Committee. This committee receives all requests to the fund for loans or grants. The committee makes recommendations to the trustees, who may approve or disapprove the recommendation of the committee. The Loan and Grant Committee is made up of the following organizations: the PTO, the Volunteer Fire Dept., the Ladies Benevolent Society, and the Trustees of the Elkins Fund.

Over the last 46 years since the fund was established, the fund has grown both through interest on the principal and proceeds from the Town Fair. The Fair was started by the CUCC, and is now a town-wide endeavor presently chaired by Lisa Carlson. Her phone # is 783-0335 and she always has great volunteer opportunities for those who want to help.

Canterbury has seen many changes since 1996. The Trust document allows the trustees of the fund some latitude in updating procedures. The trustees are always interested in your thoughts. Applications can be made through our Pastor, Bill Donoghue, or you can contact Ron Turcotte, trustee, at 620-3717.
