Pastoral Changes at the Canterbury United Community Church

As many of you know, Pastor Bill Donoghue fell and was injured this winter, and while he expects to fully recover in time, he is not able to continue his work as minister of the Canterbury United Community Church. We pray for his recovery, look forward to Bill and his wife Karen joining us in the future for a celebration of his time with us, and wish him happiness and fulfillment in his well-deserved retirement.

In his years in Canterbury, Bill joined many in town in celebrating the joys of life while helping others with their challenges and grief. His gifts as a pastor are special; he engaged children with stuffed animals pulled from a sack and adults with sermons that made the people and predicaments in Bible stories as real and present as we were.

It will be difficult to find a pastor who can achieve as much as Bill did. But we're going to work hard toward that end.

The process begins with the selection of an interim minister, followed by the search for a settled pastor. The interim minister will help us through that search while also meeting the church's day-to-day pastoral needs. The Church Council will select the interim minister, while the search for a settled pastor will involve the entire congregation. The search process typically takes one to two years, during which the congregation will examine the church's needs and the key qualities in a pastor to match them.

One thing we'll be looking for is a pastor with the ability to be involved in and a resource for the greater Canterbury community. We see this as a central role of the church, and hope the community shares that view. We'll keep you posted!

Paddling Morrill and Spender Ponds

The walk from Morrill Pond to Spender Pond/Meadow is one of my favorites in Canterbury, a lovely hour. But ever since Anne and I visited Spender for the first time in the spring of 2016 I've wanted to get out on it in a canoe. It looked like it would be really fun to poke around the many channels through the marsh. And it's just such a wild feeling place. We have wheels for our canoe which we've never used, and the road in to Morrill and the one up to Spender are both short and easy; should be ideal for using them. I checked it out with my friend Joe and we took the canoe and wheels over April 24. We knew they'd only be navigable in high Spring

I checked it out with my friend Joe and we took the canoe and wheels over April 24. We knew they'd only be navigable in high Spring water. What we didn't know was how critical that would be. They are both very shallow. Spender has many stumps and downed trees often below the surface of the water where they're very hard to see. We got better at avoiding them after fetching up on several. We found they were mostly avoidable by paying close attention to the stumps we could see. The channel to the right from the dam is easiest. Especially in Morrill Pond it's very shallow and requires close attention not to run aground.

We saw many herons, most on Spender, as well as lots of small turtles basking on the logs. There was one abandoned herons nest. The herons seemed to be going and coming from the East. Morrill Pond was loaded with ducks when we came back.

The wheels worked well, though we had to drag the canoe through a couple short sections of grassy, marshy shoreline to get around the ends of 2 beaver dams and reach the end of the road going up to Spender. About a half day's activity, with an hour going and coming back on Morrill and only a half hour on Spender when we found out about the stumps.

A good little adventure but certainly not habit forming

Canterbury Shaker Village is more than a place with historic buildings and exhibits, the landscape also helps tell the story of Shaker life and industry. Join local historian Mark Stevens on a 2 mile (round trip) excursion to the site of the old Shaker Carding Mill Factory. 
