

From the Pastor

Greetings Canterburyans,

The conversation began long before I drove into Canterbury for the first time. I have had the privilege of joining it and seeking to help expand that conversation. In the beginning leaders from Shaker Village, Church of the Woods/Kairos Earth, and Canterbury United Community Church sat down together informally to consider what it might be like to collaborate to offer an event that celebrates the many and varied expressions of spiritual practice that are a part of the landscape of our town and broader community. The heart of the Canterbury community is centered in the work of our hands and our hearts. We agreed something special happens here when those things come together.

As that conversation grew we determined we wanted to offer space for mingling some of the core elements of varied spiritual practice and how we expand that into "active worship," as we go about our daily lives. We wanted to offer opportunity to explore workshops relating to, artistic expression, philosophical reflection, singing, yoga, nature walking for reflection, etc.

Come join us this Sunday, November 5th, at Shaker Village for an event that seeks to bring folks together in that spirit. Inspired by the Shaker tradition we are calling it: "Hands to Work, Hearts to God: Living a Spiritual Life in the World Around Us." The day will include collaborative worship; workshops to foster varied practices of contemplation; sharing a meal and fellowship together; and workshops for active worship practices. The day begins at 9:30 a.m. and will conclude at 2:30 p.m.. The event is free, but we'll be accepting donations to help cover the event costs. Come join us for all or a portion of the day.

CHURCH NEWS

It has been five months since the community auction to benefit the Canterbury United Community Church, and we remain filled with gratitude for the overwhelming response to that event: more than 90 donations, from llama manure to fine art to squash rolls, almost all from Canterbury. The result of this generosity was a dynamic evening with a lively spirit, as dozens of people turned out to support the church and their neighbors in what became something much bigger than an auction of goods and services.

That spirit comes down to this: "We're all in this together ... and isn't that good!" It is the Canterbury spirit, evident in so many aspects of our community's life. There is nothing automatic about it, and nothing magical either. It happens only because people and organizations in Canterbury continue to devote themselves to fostering a living community defined by mutual care. Truly, we are blessed.

As members of the Canterbury church, we strive to contribute to this spirit, empowered by the teachings of Christ to respond to community needs and play our part in enriching the life of our community together.

This newsletter is one expression of that effort: It is produced by a church volunteer and mailed at the church's expense to every household in town. Where would we be without the connective information that fills it every month?

The church Parish House is another example. It is a hub for community and a place where vital community connections take place. In the past year alone, we have had the privilege to offer this space to the Boy Scouts, 4-H, yoga and exercise classes, a doll club, Morris dancing, a series of Avaloch music concerts, Thanksgiving and Easter community meals, Canterbury fair meetings, a fiddler's picnic and Spruces meeting, birthday parties and memorial services, the town Halloween and, of course, the Canterbury Kids Learning Center.

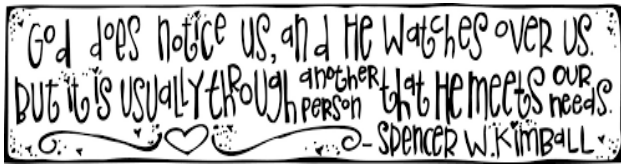

Are you curious about the new progress reporting at C.E.S.? We are moving to Proficiency Scales to show what we know. In October students in **ALL** classes took home a Home Performance task. The home performance task is a way to show our parents our new proficiency scale.

Proficiency scales help us rate our learning. We rate it by 1,2,3s. A 1 means, "I'm ready to do some things with help with others". A 2 means, "I have learned/practiced how to do things/steps needed so that I will be ready to do this on my own". A 3 means, "I can do this independently. I have achieved my goal !!"

Learners in Mrs. McCauley, Ms. Desgroseilliers, Mrs. Charest and Mrs. Theroux's classes had to explain how to make a Peanut Butter and Jelly sandwich.

In Base Camp Briggs, Base Camp Cameron, and Base Camp Wieck, learners had 5 choices. They were: make an origami wolf, bake a cake, make a s'more, wrap a present, and finally, ride a bike. We shared our tasks with our families and rated our learning using proficiency scales that we helped to create. The What Not Trail

If you are looking for a hike that is fun and different, consider the "What Not Trail" on the backside of Tom and Nancy Roy's property on Morrill Road. This is a dead end trail so plan to walk in and back out the same way. This is a private trail on private property so be respectful of the landowner's rights and wishes. Hunters, trappers, snowmobiles, and ATV's are NOT allowed, but all others are welcome. This trail is wide, well maintained, and easy to follow with rolling topography which makes it perfect for walking or snowshoeing.

The quirky thing that makes the **What Not Trail** unique and special is the incongruous items that appear randomly in the woods as you hike along. In a whimsical manner, items that you would never expect to see out in the woods suddenly appear. Trailhead parking is located on the east side of Morrill Road about 1.2 miles southeasterly of the intersection with Kimball Pond Road. There is off road parking space for one or two cars in front of a gated trail entrance.

From the trailhead, about 100 feet into the woods the trail splits into two. The left fork heads southwest and in 750 feet will bring you to Horseshoe Pond. This scenic spot you should plan to see now while the swamp maples are crimson red. The trail to the right at the fork heads northwest and is the beginning of the **What Not Trail**. You'll know you are on the correct trail if you look up in a White Pine tree and see the pelvic bone of a cow hanging there. I don't know who, how, or why it is there. 175 feet in from the beginning of the trail you'll come to a street sign that reads, "Gage Girls Road." I'll tell you the Gage Girls story some other time.

475 feet in, you'll come to an old landline telephone on an oak tree. Go ahead and place a call, no charge for long distance. 525 feet in you'll come to a flat top stump with a clothes iron plugged in to a dedicated electrical outlet on the stump. If your clothes are wrinkled this is a good place to iron them. If you are getting tired after 800 feet, there is a rocking horse that perhaps can give you a ride back to your car. There is also the sun, the moon, and the stars here if you'd like to make a wish.

At 850 feet there is a stained glass chandelier lamp fixture hanging over the trail, so if it is getting dark go ahead and turn it on. At 1,000 feet there is a lobster boat with lobster trap buoy. No lobster in sight though. At 1750 feet, a space alien Martian has been sighted in the woods. At 1900 feet stop and put a few coins in the piggy bank and then check the maple sap levels in the maple buckets hanging on the dead pine. At 2000 feet there is a red Radio Flyer wagon left over from your childhood waiting for Calvin and Hobbs to come and take a ride. 2325 feet in is a good place to stop if you need file some paperwork and are looking for some binder clips.

At 2750 feet the trail ends at a lunch box hanging on a tree. Go ahead and look inside the lunch box. The trail ends at an old range road and convergence of several property lines, so you should stop here. If you continue on to the tea kettle without land owner permission, you may be trespassing so please turn around. Enjoy the hike back to your car and leave no trace of your visit.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

COME TO A SPECIAL PROGRAM AT THE LIBRARY ON NOVEMBER 14TH

On Tuesday, November 14 at 7:00 p.m. at the Library, the Canterbury Historical Society and the Library will sponsor a presentation on the Abolitionist movement in New Hampshire prior to the Civil War. Our speaker will be Dr. Rebecca Noel, Associate Professor of History at Plymouth State University. Dr. Noel, under the auspices of an institutional grant through Pease Library in Plymouth from the National Endowment for the Humanities, conducted research for her presentation on Nathaniel Peabody Rogers, the noted abolitionist from Plymouth who moved to Concord in the 1830s to edit the abolitionist newspaper, The Herald of Freedom. Rogers was an associate of Stephen Symonds Foster, the firebrand abolitionist from Canterbury, and they often traveled together to deliver their messages. Rogers was also an early advocate of equal rights for women, and was a noted White Mountain writer. Come meet this rediscovered New Hampshire icon in a presentation that is both informative and entertaining. Everyone is welcome, and refreshments will be served.

OUR CANTERBURY HISTORY EARNS EXCELLENCE AWARD!

The Association of Historical Societies of New Hampshire (AHSNH) recognizes outstanding work of organizations and individuals seeking to preserve, interpret, and/or promote appreciation and understanding of an aspect of New Hampshire history. AHSNH's mission is to encourage and assist in the study, preservation and understanding of New Hampshire's history.

Our town's 20th century Canterbury history, "Staying Small in a Century of Change" was selected to receive an award for excellence by the Association of Historical Societies of New Hampshire. It was presented on Saturday, October 21st at the group's annual meeting held in Peterborough. In choosing the Canterbury Historical Society to receive this award the Awards Selection Committee considered the following criteria under the category of Research/Documentation:

1. Significance or impact of undertaking on a community, region, or the state of N.H.
2. Use of professional practice, volunteer engagement and degree of support
3. Projects (or people) that act as a model for others seeking to preserve and interpret local history (excluding building preservation projects)

Bob Scarponi, president of the Historical Society attended and accepted the award on behalf of the Society. In doing so he stated, "I accept this award with the greatest of pride in what our writer, Kathryn Grover and over 200 Canterbury volunteers accomplished together over four years in producing this history.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR NEWS

The Selectmen and Town Office Staff are working on the FY 2018 budget. Department Heads will be presenting their first budget requests at the November 6th Selectmen's meeting.

We have had another leak in the water line to the Town Hall. The Selectmen have decided to replace the entire water line from the Town Office to all the buildings in the center. The Highway Department will be working with Water Service Operators to complete the work.

The Highway Dept. employees have attended a training session hosted by the NH Municipal Association in October. The training class, Hard Road to Travel, is a half day course that covers issues related to municipal roads. They are also scheduled to attend "Road Maintenance 101" class in November.

The Selectmen have signed a 2-year Contribution Assurance Program agreement with Primex that limits our increases for Workers Compensation and Property Liability Insurance to no more than 10% per year.

The Selectmen and Town Administrator met with the School Board for an exchange of information on unanticipated expenses during 2017 and potential expenses in 2018. This is the second year that we have met with the School Board for this purpose, which has proven productive to both Boards.

The garage at the Sam Lake House is undergoing a renovation. The garage will be raised and moved to allow a foundation and concrete slab to be poured. The garage will then be replaced in its original position. Exterior work to the siding, windows and doors will be done in the future. Oliver Fifield is raising and moving the building, Al Brock will do the concrete work.

As a reminder, The Town Office and Tax Collector/Town Clerk operating hours have changed. The new hours are: Town Office- Mon. & Wed. 9-1, Thur. 10-2. Town Clerk/Tax Collector Mon. 9-3, Tues. 3-7, Thurs. 12-7.

"I think," said Lavinia, who was always so serious, "that it is supposed to be all the hands that help us, but Douglas could only draw one of them."

Mrs. Klein had almost forgotten Douglas in her pleasure at finding the class so responsive. When she had the others at work on another project, she bent over his desk and asked whose hand it was.

Douglas mumbled, "It's yours, Teacher." Then Mrs. Klein recalled that she had taken Douglas by the hand from time to time; she often did that with the children. But that it should have meant so much to Douglas ...

Perhaps, she reflected, this was her Thanksgiving, and everybody's Thanksgiving—not the material things given unto us, but the small ways that we give something to others.

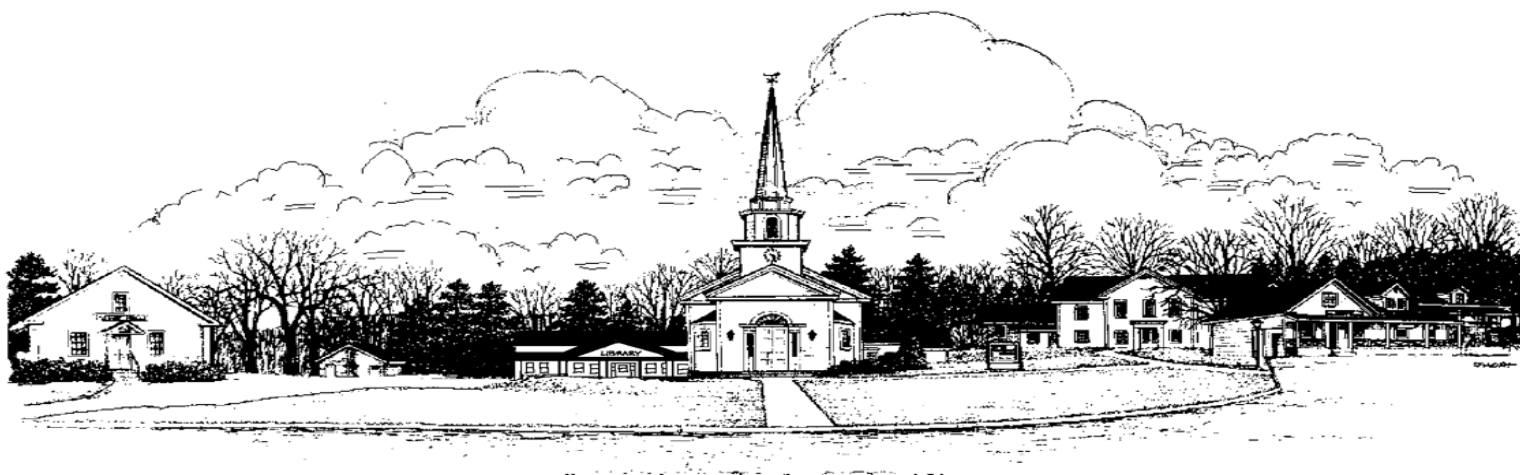
