CES NEWS



The annual CES Graham P. Chynoweth Spelling Bee will be held on Thursday, January 18 at 1:00 P.M. The winner will compete with other fifth through eighth grade school champions at the NH State Bee, which will be held in Concord at the Capitol Center for the Arts on February 24 at 1:00 P.M. Other grade level bees will be held throughout the month of January and the winners will be announced in the February newsletter.

The Shaker Regional School District 2018-2019 budget meetings begin with two public hearings in January. At these meetings, the details of the proposed budget will be explained, and the public may ask questions or provide input. The first meeting will take place at Canterbury Elementary School on January 8 and the second meeting will be held at Belmont Middle School on January 10. Both meetings will begin at 6:00 P.M. A deliberative session will be held on February 7 at Belmont High School beginning at 6:00 P.M. At this session, all warrant articles will be considered. There will be opportunities for explanation, discussion, and amendment of each article. The conclusion of each article will result in voting either to add the article to the ballot for voting on Election Day in its original form, or to add the article to the ballot for voting as amended at this session. When the deliberative session is adjourned, the language of each article will be finalized, but there will be no decision on whether or not it is passed. On Election Day, March 13, voters will mark "yes" or "no" on each warrant article in the voting booths with the outcome of each article being decided. Belmont residents will vote at Belmont High School and Canterbury residents will vote at Canterbury Elementary School. Individuals who qualify for absentee voting may contact Stacy Kruger, District Clerk, at 603-267-9223 ext. 5314.

There will be no school on Monday January 1. Classes will resume on Tuesday January 2. There will also be no school on January 15, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, and January 19 a district staff in-service day.

POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Members of the Police Department would like to wish everyone a safe, happy, and healthy 2018. Please give yourself some extra time when traveling this holiday season. We would like to make sure that you arrive to your destination safely.

The Canterbury Police Department would like to remind everyone, as the snow has finally arrived and it starts accumulating, Town Ordinance #1 takes effect:

It shall be a violation of this ordinance to put, place, or store or cause to be put, placed, or stored snow or ice in or across any road in Canterbury during any private snow removal activities.

State law also requires you to keep your car clear of snow so that it won't fly off your roof and hit the car behind you.

Coming soon: The Police Department is working on getting a permanent "pharmaceutical drop box" that will be located inside the Police Department.

A reminder: to reach a police officer you need to call 228-1010 which is our 24-hour dispatch line. If it is an emergency, 911 is the best way. The 783-0433 number is for business, such as requesting reports, pistol permits, or looking to leave a message for a particular officer by listening to the automated prompts.

Since the last newsletter, the Canterbury Police Department has responded to 116 Calls for Service, 4 Motor Vehicle Accidents, issued 78 Citations (which includes warnings), investigated 10 incidents, and had 4 Arrests.

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The organization's December meeting was highlighted by the swearing in ceremony of department members of all ranks. Ben Bynum, the town clerk, along with family members, attended the swearing in of Dave Nelson. Dave has been a full-time member of Canterbury Fire Department for the last eight years and was promoted to the rank of lieutenant. His wife Paula did the badge pinning.

In cooperation with the Concord Fire Department, members trained at a building scheduled for demolition in the city. This training gave the members an excellent opportunity to practice rescue and hose skills in a realistic training environment.

Winter is prime time for Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning. Our homes are tightly sealed and heating systems are operating. As many of us spend more time indoors during the Winter months, here are a few reminders to reduce our risk of CO poisoning.

- Make sure all your vents for heating systems, gas, or solid fuel devices such as gas dryers are open and keep free of snow or ice.
- Do not use unvented portable heating devices such as a propane heater inside enclosed buildings.
- Do not warm up or run vehicles or gas operated machinery in attached garages or enclosed spaces.
- Maintain a CO detector on all levels of the residence. If the alarm sounds, exit the building and call 911. CO, being odorless and colorless, can only be detected with a metering device. The department has the ability to check for the presence of and the source of CO.

Have a safe Winter.

In November, we gave out enough food to create 8,838 meals.

50-50 Raffle Holiday Fundraiser

We sold \$302 in Raffle tickets. The winner, Jen M. has donated her winnings of \$151 back to the pantry. Thank you everyone for joining in!

Gift of Lights (NHMS Winter Wonderland)

We have started to receive food from the Gift of Lights. In 2016 we received a total of 9,360.66 pounds of food and \$606 in funds. Between the food and funds, this adds up to giving out enough food to create 10,224.55 Meals. Wow!

So far in 2017 we have received 8,790.30 pounds of food (funds are not received until shortly after the last delivery). Before this is over, we will be receiving about three more deliveries. I think we'll top last year!

The food received from Gift of Lights helps us to replenish the food given out at the pantry and is very much appreciated.

We will be closed from December 29, 2017 – January 15, 2017 for inventory and will reopen on Tuesday, January 16, 2017.

THE OLD IRON BOILER TRAIL

Back in the early 1900's portable sawmills and men living in temporary logging camps were commonplace in Canterbury. These portable sawmills were sometimes powered by wood-fired steam boilers made of heavy cast iron segments riveted together. One of these forgotten big old iron boilers remains hidden in the Canterbury woods little known except by a few abutting landowners, hunters, and surveyors.

A well-maintained trail to this boiler exists off of the back of Kent Ruesswick and Doneta Fischer's property. The trail zig zags back and forth on rustic plank bridges across the brook that empties out of Morrill Pond (not to be confused with Morrill Mill Pond). The brook water splash makes ice formations on the rocks and bridges and makes this a pretty winter hike. The loop trail is about 2 miles but there are several sub-loop options that can shorten or extend your hike as you like.

In addition to the boiler and logging camp site, there is also an old cellar hole and rock lined well on the height of land and many other things to watch for including: hiding trolls, square dancing couples, kerosene lamps, a windmill, tree swing, balancing sticks, rock formations, a money tree, knick-knacks, a pledge rock and bonus points if you spot the hunter's tree stand.

The trailhead to start this adventure is in Kent and Doneta's dooryard and this is a private trail on private property, so ask permission, respect the landowner's rights and wishes, do no damage, and leave no trace. Cross over the arch bridge and head east uphill following the brook. The trails are easy to follow but if you get confused or turned around, downhill following the brook will always bring you back to your car.

If you are pacing or have an exercise step counter, about .62 miles in from the trailhead, you'll come to a rock mid-trail shaped like Napoleon's hat. If you sight along the crest of the hat and look sharp, about 100 feet south of the trail into the woods you'll find the old cast iron boiler and logging camp site. Old timers tell of using this remote boiler as rendezvous spot when different deer hunters would start from Old Tilton Road, Lamprey Road, Hackleboro Road, and Borough Road and move towards each other, meeting at the boiler at some designated time.

About .8 miles in you'll come to the ledge headwall where the brook splits into two sub-brooks coming together from opposite directions. At this point you cross over the brook one more time and turn 180 degrees and climb up above the brook to the height of the land where a scenic remote cellar hole begs with questions to be answered. Who lived way up there? How did they get there? Why? And where did they go?

Head back downhill following the stone lined paths and enjoy the green 'emerald aisles' feeling you get as you are surrounded by lush green moss growing along the banks of the brook. If you enjoyed this hike, leave a coin or two at the money tree on your way by.
