

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Here are a few reminders as we enter the busy time of year for outdoor grilling and cooking.

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reports -

- 8,900 home fires are started by outdoor grills each year.
- 16,600 patients went to the hospital emergency room because of injuries involving grills.

To help prevent injuries and fires, follow these safety tips.

- Grills should be at placed at least 10' from the structure and never under eaves.
- Open the gas grill lid before igniting to prevent gas buildup.
- Check all gas connections and the regulator for leaks with liquid soap and water solution before starting the grill for the season.
- Keep the grill clean remove any grease buildup.
- Never leave the grill unattended while cooking and keep children at least 3' away.
- Like woodstove ashes, charcoal ashes can stay hot for a long time. Dispose of them in a metal container.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

Construction continues on the renovation at the Sam Lake House. The weather put us behind schedule a couple weeks, but the concrete work was completed with approximately 12" of stone under the floor and a waterproof vapor barrier applied before the basement floor was poured. We also applied an epoxy-based sealer to the exterior of the foundation along with a perimeter foundation drain. The framers have started. We anticipate the framing will be completed the first week of June.

A Slip, Trip and Fall prevention class will be held on June 6th for all town employees. This class is provided by Primex the town's insurance carrier.

Our Town Road Agent, Jim Sawicki, resigned in April. Jim worked for the town since November of 2001. We want wish Jim well in his future endeavors.

With the staff shortage at the Highway Dept. we have hired a seasonal full-time employee, TJ Bibeau, for mowing and maintaining town property this year.

At the Town Meeting this year, residents voted to ... "appoint an energy committee that will research and advise officials, administrators, and citizens of Canterbury on steps necessary to limit greenhouse gas emissions."

The Board of Selectmen are accepting volunteers to serve on this committee. The committee will consist of five (5) members and two (2) alternates. If you are interested in serving on this committee, please contact the Town Office.

CANTERBURY'S ARCHITECTURAL SURVEY **MOVING POSITIVELY AHEAD**

Marking a significant step ahead for the historical society, the Architectural Survey Committee under the chairmanship of Harry not suitable for strollers; please leave pets at home. Kinter is moving aggressively ahead to complete the survey of 20 historic properties in Canterbury, including interviewing current owners, researching properties' history, collecting photographs and documenting ownership titles (where possible). Once completed, the study will provide a significant database upon which to build a more extensive history covering as many as 50 properties in Canterbury. The committee's aim is to mount an exhibit in the Elkins Memorial Building in 2019. All materials and information collected will become part of the Society's Archival Record of Canterbury which will subsequently be a searchable data base for research and information.

MEMORIES

Too busy to do a fresh hike so I'm having to draw on my memories.

Time was when I would make one or two-night trips to Grey Knob cabin on Mt. Adams every year, several times a year. I was working in my shop seven days a week with employees during the week – crazy. These escapes to Mt. Adams preserved my sanity.

I'd usually go up between late February and early June. No longer full-on winter, for which I wasn't equipped, and the mountains not yet over run with hikers, it was a perfect time to be up there.

Often the snow would be gone down here. My first view of The Presidentials still totally enveloped in snow always caused me to be amazed that I was actually going up there – to a very different world.

Signs of spring would disappear as I gained altitude. Ultimately, I'd be hiking on packed snow and often ice, needing crampons on the steep Lowe's Path. One year I found twenty-foot drifts near the summit. At one point I was more swimming in snow than walking. I frequently had Mt. Adams all to myself.

I'd savored this season, of spring down here, snow on the mountains, since I was a kid. I'd discovered that I could climb the tallest maple on our place, the highest point on Shaker Ridge, before the tree leafed out and see a peak, must have been Mt. Washington, glowing white on the horizon.

I cherish my White Mountain snow memories above many others. Watching a fellow hiker disappear instantly into a "spruce trap," the snow being deeper than the tops of younger spruces so the trail (and the blazes) were totally obscured, making it easy to walk above the top of a spruce which kept the snow around it too loose to support one's weight. That fellow did some snow swimming. Better to see than experience. Another time, just when I was explaining spruce traps to my hiking partner, he accidentally stepped off the well-trodden path and into deep and heavy spring snow. It took me some time to extricate him. Don't know how long it would have taken him to get out had I not been there.

Some snow experiences were better in memory than actuality. Like the time Roy Hutchinson and I were having a lovely hike with the Boy Scouts in warm and snow free Wild River Valley until our route took us up onto the peaks of the Carter Range where deep snow involved us in a long and tedious stretch of post-holing.

I have mixed feelings when the leaves come on the trees. You can see so much more hiking in the winter.
