### Canterbury Fund: Here for Students, Those In Need

Greetings Canterbury Neighbors,

Let me begin by saying the Canterbury Fund is currently accepting applications until the end of July from Canterbury residents for its yearly college scholarships. For more information on how to apply please contact Jessie Tichko by

That's great, right, but you may not be familiar with The Canterbury Fund or the many ways it has been a benefit to our Canterbury

community for the last 55 years. I'd like to take a minute to describe its history, the groups that help administer it, and the sorts of Canterbury needs it was founded to help support.

The Canterbury Fund is a charitable trust established by Alexander Standish of Canterbury on June 10, 1966. One purpose of the Fund is to assist Canterbury residents who are in need of financial assistance due to the destruction of their homes or other hardships resulting from an emergency, who have endured poor health of an immediate family member, or who need special education or treatment as a result of physical or mental handicaps of an immediate family member.

As mentioned above, another use of the Fund is to offer some assistance to students as they continue their studies in higher education. In addition, the Fund may make grants to organizations to assist in the funding of community projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, are in the best interest of all Canterbury residents.

As stipulated by Mr. Standish, the trustees of the Fund were established to be the trustees of the Canterbury United Community Church, though The Canterbury Fund's assets are not associated with the church itself. The trust also established that a Canterbury Fund Loan and Grant Committee would work in tandem with the fund trustees. This committee receives all requests to the fund for loans or grants. The committee makes recommendations to the trustees, who may approve or disapprove the recommendation of the committee.


The Loan and Grant Committee is made up of representatives associated with town organizations such as the PTO, the fire department, the Canterbury Benevolent Society, and the Trustees of the Elkins Library. Their hope is to continue to expand involvement on this committee by even more of our town's community stakeholders.



In 2000, a group of community-spirited townspeople formed an LLC and successfully raised money to purchase the building housing the Canterbury Country Store and Post Office in order to keep them from permanently closing.

Today, the Country Store and PO continue to serve the community despite challenging times for small, local stores.

Much of the thanks goes to our hardworking storekeepers, Toni and Joe, and a community of volunteers that have tackled any task that needed "fixin" to keep things running.

Twenty years later, the store and PO continue to serve our community. The recent pandemic highlighted how important community involvement in sustaining a local institution can be and how neighbors supporting each other fosters a sense of place and belonging among people.

In 2020, another volunteer group, Friends of the Canterbury Country Store, formed with the purpose of helping our storekeepers, the LLC and Canterbury at large, with projects we hope will rejuvenate a "well-worn" building and create new ways to keep the store a sustainable and vibrant center for the Canterbury community. Money raised will go towards two main efforts.

First, a variety of much-needed physical projects such as

roofing, flooring and painting will be undertaken to preserve the building for the next generations. Much has been done, most with volunteer help, but the list is long and it will get done with Canterbury spirit.

Second, an effort to fund projects to enhance and draw in more customers to the store, in order to maintain its sustainability in a changing world, will be undertaken. These include equipment to facilitate more local and specialty products, such as produce and local crafts, new signage and outdoor seating and landscaping. Our plan also includes

sponsoring a few outdoor events, on behalf of the store, to foster more awareness of the store and its offerings, while at the same time promoting community gathering and spirit, building upon the original concept behind saving the store in 2000.

To get us off to a great start, two anonymous donors have pledged to match dollar for dollar the first \$6,500 raised. We hope you will join in this effort in any way you can.





Another way they get you: They will send you an email from a friend who needs money and will ask you to buy gift cards for them. Call your friend first and ask if they sent you that email. More than likely it is not your friend, or their email had been hacked.

There are a lot of scams/scammers out there and they will keep trying to find creative ways to get your information. If any free or rock-bottom deal seems too good to be true, walk away. They have even called the Police Department!

The department has been getting a lot of calls about dogs running loose. Please make sure your dog(s) have a collar and/ or tags with your information on it so you can be contacted in case we come across them running loose. If they have gotten out, call and let us know. If we see them, we will be in touch.
